Poll Tax Resolution.

Austin, Tex.-Senator Davidson introduced the following in the senate:

Section 1. That article 6, section 2, of the constitution of the state of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Sec. 2. Every male person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of 21 years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an election, and the last six months within the district or county in which he offers to vote, shall be a qualified elector. And every male person of foreign birth subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who, not less than six months before any election at which he offers to vote, shall have declared his intontion to become a citicen of the United States in accordance with the federal naturalization laws, and and shall have resided in this state one year next preceding such election, and the last six months in the county in which he offers to vote, shall also be deemed a qualified elector; and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence; provided that electors living in any unorganized county may vote at any election precinct in the county to which such county is attached for judicial purposes; and provided further that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the state of Texas shall exhibit to the judges of the election where he offers to vote, in any election, his poll tax receipt, such receipt showing his
