his name as Will Ayers, stated that he was en route from Cam county to the Indian Territory ooking for a home, and he told
he story of the death of a little boy freezing

I camped the other side of Red iver, and near me was camped Martin. He stated he was moving from a point in McLennan county to the Choctaw nation,
where his brother had secured a place for year. We crossed the river east of town and started in the Territory, camping on a little creek for the night. Our camps were only and yards apart. Martin, his wife ng about 12 years old, a boy There was a boy about 5 years old, ons about 4 and a little girl wagont 2 years old. He had two when he went to retire for the aight, be slept in one wagon with his wife and little girl, and the three boys slept in the other wagon, where they were supposed to be enmfortable. The weather was colder thanany of us thought,
however, and about 5 o'elock the next morning I was awakened by Mrs. Martin's screams.
It seems that at about that time of the morning she was wakened by hearing moans from wagon near them, and when she went to him he was uncovered, and so badly frozen that he could to him he was gasping for breath. We were all strangers in that part of the country and did not Mr. Martin's oldest son was put on a horse and started to find physician. He returned after awhile with his nose and ears
frost bitten, and said he hadfound an old darkey who told him that the nearest physician was in Deni-
son, and that was ton miles away.

While the boy was gon > for the doctor we did all we could for the frozen boy, but he never spoke or regained consciousness, and died an hour or so after he was found to be frozen. The mother called the little frozen fellow Danny, and
remarked two three times that Sunday would have been his fifth birthday. "I tried to get the family to come to Denison with me, where we could stop until the blizzard had spent its force and they could resume our journey. He steadfastly refused, and he went on his dead boy to his brother's place in the Territory, and would bury him there.

I have never witnessed grief like the mother's. There was a smile on the lips of the boy that had settled over his countenance after the last agonies before the numbness of death came to him, and she believed when I left her that the little fellow would awaken when he got warm, and would
not believe that life was extinct, even two hours after he had quit eveathing and his form was per-
brectly atiff in the wagon where he had met death.
"I was frightened by this experience, recrossed the river and
starced to Denison. The weather had moderated when I reached Pawpaw hill and 1 decided to stop." Ayers and family went on to Den
