half million dollars. The finest business block is a mass of rui The fire spread along Main street strong wind building after building went down before its mighty march. The fire department is no well equipped and this condition militated greatly against efficient
work on the part of the firemen. The Katy road sustained $\$ 30,000$ damage by the loss of its freight and passenger depots. The Madfered $\$ 30,000$ loss, including their planing mill. The heaviest lo was that of the Turner Hardware company. They carried the largest stock of any similar es-

Green's Brigade.
This mulitary organization held its reunion last week at Brenham, on which occasion Gov. Sayers,
one of its members, delivered an address. The following is of interest, being a history of Green's brigade, one of the most gallant and famous Confed-
erate
commands in the transMississippi department, was mustered into service Aug. 20, 1861.
Gen. H. H. Sibley was the first Gen. H. H. Sibley was the first Grigade commander, and of first regiment. Soon after the brigade went into serviee Col. Green was made a brigadier general by order of the
war department, and commanded the brigade until he was promoted to major general for gallant field. Upon his promotion Gen. W. P. Hardeman was placed in position he served until the close of the war. The brigade wa
ordered to New Mexicn, where it saw much hard service. The bat tle of Val Verde was fought Feb. thirty-seventh anniversary of the first fight in which it took part. The battle of Glorietts was fought on March 28, and Parelto in June tory fighting was done and many skirmishes bad, but these three were the principal general engagements in New Mexico. In these the fighting qualitics of both the
rank and file of the command were developed and its reputation established, which it most
