An Address Delivered on the Sub ject by J. H. Connell.

The following is a portion of an address by J. H. Connell, director of the Texas Experiment
station, at Beeville, Tex.: When should diversification be
practiced? Though every compracticed? Though every com-
munity should diversify, each should have a specialty. Let one of the world for the excellence butter, poultry, beef, hay, corn, wheat, hops, flax, cotton or carload or trainload. The communities should combine and coforget the home living that should be daily found in every farmer's garden, his pasture, barn and
smoke house. When these item are neglected in the effort to snatch wealth through large sales crops the bread and butter of the der mercies of strangers, whom we can expect little
The individual farmer must first supply from his own resourc life before arranging for the money or sales crops, which suc ceed or fail largely in proportion
to the peculiarities of market to the pe
conditions.
progressive farmer is superior to market conditions and beyond the
blighting influences of "combina blighting influences of "combina-
tions" and "corners" that originate in cities. In ante-bellum days cotton was grown as a sur-
plus crop only after the food and clothing supply of the plantation had been assured. To this sys success and prosperity of that time must be attributed. The state sell too much for their own good and depend on markets for those supplies which should nat urally arise from the farm. The
volume of trade is increased, but the farmer pays the freight.
The Californians annually ship carloads of beans to Boston via
Texas, there to have them canned Texas,there to have them canned and shipped back to Texas and to other states for our intellectnaCalifornia beans and Boston at mosphere so valuable as to pa for these long hauls and much selling? It is not necessary before this audience to attempt to
show the reason why Texas should grow and supply the tons and tons of fresh and canned materi als consumed in this state. This
will soon be achieved. Our coss conntry climate is fourteen to tiventy-one days earlier than the
California truck-growing regions and with the much more favor able water conditions. We have an immense state market and are conveniently near the large dis population.
But it is not.only in the matter of vegetables that our people are of meats, sugar, hay and many manufactured articles the way is open to immediate development. Those who possess enterprise and intelligence sufficient to see thes undeveloped opportunities and are first to enter the field mu reap a rich harvest. We have
undeveloped alluvial soils that will produce alfalfa of the best quality, selling for $\$ 12$ per ton, a the lowest cost possible within
the United States. Our native prairie grasses are capable o much greater use and profit than
has yeen developed. Within has yet been developed. Within
150 miles of the coast we have the most reliable fruit and vegetable growing region for marke
purposes that can be found
in the United States, while the health conditions are all that can be desired-together with cheap lands and low tax rate; but one drawback consists
in our inability to intelligently combine many of these rich natural resources, with the neces_
sary for labor the development of paying industries. But the way is rapidly opening up, extensive experıments are made annually, and demonstrations of the great. est possible values are being con-
ducted by private enterprise and at state expense. Those investi gations, together with organiza-
tion of these newly established interests, will not not only secure cheaper freight rates, uniform ty of products, but, altogether, will tend to increase the yield per and teach the highest principles of economy and thrift that lie in
the lessons to be learned in sidering the adaptation of our soil and climate to crop produc-
