



DEATH IN MID AIR.

Appalling Spectacle of a Man Electrocuted Between Heaven and Earth.

Houston, Tex., Oct. 12 .- The appalling spectacle of a man electrocuted in mid air, was witnessed on one of the main thoroughfares of this city yesterday afternoon about 3:40 o'clock. D. C. Mc-Lane, a lineman in the employ of the Southwestern Telephone company, was the unfortunate victim, and he was burned to death as he was at work near the top of a big telephone pole at the southwest corner of Capital avenue and cepted as reliable. 


