Heney, Moore of Cameron, Texas, outlin ing a plan for the organization of outhern farmers, business men and laborers into;a gigantic corporation for the purpose of build ing and operating cotton factories and promoting such other in-
dustries as may be demonstrated dustries as may be demonstrated
to be profitable and helpful to th outh,
These suggestions are, first,organize a company, chartered un der the laws of Texas, with apital of $\$ 200,000,000$ or more Second, build cotton factories in the southern states in propor tion to capital stock taiken, and let them be of sufficient capacity to manufacture all surplus and more besides. They call atten tion to the fact that cotton is
worth only $\$ 25$ per bale at the worth only $\$ 25$ per bale at the
farm and only brings that amount to the farmer and only that at the community in which it is produc ed, while the same bale brings 150 to the community which manufacturers it into cloth. In ther words Texas' crop of 3,000,000 bales, if manufactured in Texas, would bring to the state over $\$ 500,000,000$ instead of $\$ 75$,Whe under existing conditions. Whether such a plan as this would be practicable or not, we cannot say, but one thing is sure ard of her opportunities until she ard of her opportunities until she
