



Although the proposed amendments to the constitution were published in the News for four consecutive weeks, their contents have somewhat lapsed from memory, and therefore we are quoting them in brief below with a short comment on each

The first one reads: For amendment to Section 5 Arcle 11, of the Constitution authorizing cities of more than 5000 inhab'tants to draft their charters by a vote of the people.

As the Dallas News suggests much of the time of the Legislature is now consumed in passing upon city charter bills. If this matter were left to the cities themselves, the Legislature would be relieved of much work and thus have more time for other legislation, or be permitted to complete the work sooner. For this reason, alone, it would be well for the country voter to vote for this amendment.

The second amendment provides for a six years' term for prison ccom missioners. Under the present law the commissioners are appointed every two years. The amendment would provide for the apointment of one commissioner every two years, thus insuring that the majority of the commissioners will always be experienced officers and also rethe wiles of politics.

The third proposition is:

For the Amendment of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of New Subscriptions Received at this Texas, regulating the term of office of the Board of Regents of the State University, and other boards of trustees or managers heretofore or hereafter to be stablished by law.

The same conditions apply in regard to this amendment that apply to the one stated above. 


