Cotton House Burns,

Right after noon Friday a fire alarm was turned in from the O. T. Anderson gin and when the fire boys reached the scene they found that the cotton house was in flames from top to bottom.

The gin hands thought the fire was in the gin house proper, and for that reason were slow in turning in the alarm, but when the boys were notified they made a quick run and did excellent work. It looked almost impossible to save the gin itself, but plenty of water and plenty of pressure combined with good head work on the part of the fire boys succeeded in getting the flames under control in only a few minutes.

The waterworks easily paid for itself in the amount of property saved Friday. Anderson's gin alone cost as much or more than the waterworks system, and if it had burned there is no question but that a lot of other property would have been destroyed along with it. The cotton yard, the livery stable and possibly one or both of the other gins would certainly have been destroyed if the Anderson gin had burned. The cotton house was a total loss, and we understand that it contained six or seven bales of lint cotton some of which will be
