The Parcels Post Laws. Yesterday, January 1, 1913, the "Parcels Post Llaw" became effective, and packages weighing not more than eleven pounds and meas uring not to exceed seventy-two (72) inches in length and girth combined, can now be shipped by mail to all parts of the United States and United States territory.

The cost of sending articles by parcels post depends on the distance such articles have to be carried. For the purpose of carrying this law into effect the United States is divided into eight zones with rates of postage applicable to each as follows:

1st zone, 1 to 50 miles, 1st pound Sc. each additional pound 3c.

2nd zone, 50 to 150 miles, 1st pound 6c, each additional pound, 4c. 3rd zone, 150 to 300 miles, 1st pound 7c, each additional pound 5c. 4th zone, 300 to 600 miles, 1st pound 8c, each additional pound 6c.

Marketing vs. Production.

The recent report of the Federal Agricultural Department giving a comparison of the 1911 crop with that of 1910 teaches a very practical and comprehensive lesson in economics

The Texas cotton crop in 1911 produced 4,297,248 bales valued at \$230,910,000 and in 1910 produced 3,072,932 bales valued at \$247.880,-000, the 1911 crop showing an increase in bales of 1,224,316 and a decrease in value of \$16,970,900 over 1910. The Texas farmers paid a penalty of \$16,970,000 for increasing production 1,224,316 bales. The Texas situation is typical of that of the entire south.

I Certainly the farmers of the country are not suffering through lack of inability to produce cotton; in fact excessive production is destraying him. He needs help in decreasing production and in such emergencies drouth and the boll weevil appear to be his most reliable friends and allies.
