





These companies are the Texas Company, The Corsicana Petroleum Company and the Lone Star Gas Company. All of these have representatives in the field taking all the leases they ean secure.

Nor, judging from what we have heard from good authority, is it difficult to secure leases. Within a few days one company leased 30,000 acres and is still taking leases. Some of this land comes up to the suburbs of Alhany. Some of the other companies taking leases have doubtless leased as much as the company referred to, and probably more. Leasing is going on over most of the county, but especially do we have reference to the Albany vicinity, Sedwick and Moran vicinities, and the territory north of Albany toward the Matthews well.

Leases are bringing all the way from 25c an acre to \$1.00 an acre. The Texas Company is already beginning on the second well on Judge Matthews' ranch, using matural gas as fuel, and is planning, we are told, to start two more wells soon on the said ranch. This company is also planning to start the second well on the J. H. Nail ranch. It has recently begun a new well near

We are told, further, that there will probably be a well begun early in the spring much nearer
