THE MILLER OIL FIELD MAY CAUSE LAW SUIT

Dr. R. W. Miller, of Santa Barbara, Cal., and the recognized father of the oil developments in Archer county, was a business caller at our office on Tuesday, He informed us that "The Miller oil field will be developed and the wells allowed to produce, or I will get beat in a law suit."

Dr Miller appears in earnest, and determined to force the Corsicana Petroleum Co. to either finish developing the field, or return his contract with them.

Dr. Miller has had an expert, Mr. Puffinberg, on the grounds all the time drilling has progressed and knows exactly what has been struck.

Puffinberg says oil in consider able quantities has been cased off The Corsicana people say they have struck nothing more than a four barrel well, and drilling has been abandoned.

The prospects for a big legal battle are excellent, and the palms of our attorneys are itching in anticipation.
