The Federal Re prots show the United States produced 16,109,349 bales in 1911. which sold for \$732,420,000 and in 1910, there were 11,965,962 bales produced which sold for **\$820,320,000**. The 1911 crop exceeded the 1910 production by **4,137,387** bales and sold for \$87,-900,000 less.

There are 131758 acres of cultivated land in Young County and 50776 acres are devoted to the production of cotton. The cord shows that 39 per cent of our improved farm land is devoted to cotton and it has been the predominating crop ever since the county was settled.
