These little matters, however, were generally settled with an explanation involving a case of mistaken identity of the animal, accompanied by a check for the full value of the same and the whole matter sealed with a hearty olng drink at the load bar.

The county throughout all its history has sent but one man to the penitentiary for stealing cattle, (and he pleaded guilty), a fact which proves either the extreme honesty of the people along this line or the extreme leniency sealed inth a hearty long drink at the local bar.

During the first few years after reorganization of the county there was a suit pending in the District Court involving the location of the county seat. The case involved the construction of the original acts of organization and reoranization and several prominent attorneys were engaged in before Hon. J. R. Flemin, district judge.
