

DEVELOPMENT IN YOUNG

The Corbett well in the extreme northern edge of Stephens county, just over the Young county line, is being prepared for a shot and it is confidently believed by those interested in the oil development of the southern part of this county that it will prove one of the best in the field and prove up all the country between Graham and the Stephens county line. The Corbett well is 3,925 feet deep and has 2,000 feet of oil in the hole. It will be plugged back to the 3,600 foot sand and given a 500-quart shot as soon as tankage can be erected and pipe laid.

The Vick well, which is between the Corbett and the Hill wells in the same section, is making a better showing as drilling progresses and will likely strike the deep sand by the close of the week.

In the northern part of the county the Ajax-Texas Oil Corporation has made a location and is moving material on Block 1451, on the S. M. J. Benson place near Jean, and will make a deep test. This is in the shallow belt, where oil is supposed to be in paying quantities at from 800 to-1,000 feet. The deep test will prove whether the sands found in the Graham and Arnold wells exist in the northern part of the county. Just over the county line from this new test location are a number of rigs for the development of the shallow fields in the vicinity of the Andrews wells. This shallow sand was struck in the Steen well, seven miles north of town, three months ago at a depth of 319 feet, but as the well was for a '4000foot test of the field no attention was paid to it and it is not known what the sand in that locality would produce. However, it is known that a shallow pool exists in the northern part of this and the southern part of Archer county and the early development of the field is expected. R. F. PIGEON EGGS ARE FERTILE

Especially True Where Birds Have Free-Range, Are Healthy and Given Proper Feed.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Pigeon eggs are usually fertile if the pigeons are healthy and properly fed, especially when they have free range. One squab (usually the male) frequently hatches first, and where there are several cases where one squab outgrows its nest mate, it may be advisable to sort the squabs in the nests, making the pairs as uniform as possible in size and age. If the parent birds die, the squabs may sometimes be removed to a nest where there is only one squab, or they may be fed artificially, although this process takes considerable time.

UNDERSTOOD FRENCH GOVERN-MENT IS WILLING TO SEND IT OVER ON REQUEST.

WAS IN MUCH WAR SERVICE

Three Frenchmen, Including General's Cook, Want to Accompany. Train to This Side.

Paris .- The French government is reviously considering the suggestion that the special train which was put at the disposal of General Pershing early in 1918 be presented to the American people as a souvenir of America's participation in the war,

The train would be given to the general and shipped to the United States, where General Pershing would then turn it over to the war department. It would be exhibited throughout the United States. General Pershing made his last trip on it the night of Aug. 31, when he left Paris for Brest.

INSANE PATIENTS TO BE REMOVED FROM JAILS

All Counties Will Send Their Insane to Asylum at Rusk for Care.

Austin, Texas .- Governor Hobby has sent notification by wire to the county judges of the various counties in Texas notifying them that the east Texas . hospital for the insane at Rusk has been completed and patients are now being received. 'The county judges are instructed to transfer insane patients in the county jails to the new asylum, saying that the institution is prepared to care for patients at the rate of 75 per week.

Statistics gathered by the governor from the various county judges in the state disclose that there are at present confined in the jails a total of 278 insane patients, divided as follows: Ninety-four white men, 49 white women, 71 negro men, 63 negro women and six Mexicans;

ARMS SMUGGLING ON BORDER IS CHARGED

Former Secret Service Man Says Villa Gets Supplies in This Way.

New York. - Between \$17,000,000 and \$20,000,000 worth of goods are smuggled annually across the Mexican border, more than one fourth of which are arms and ammunition, according, to a statement issued by the national association for the protection of American rights in Mexico, quoting Dr. P. B. Altendorf, former member of the United States military intelligence department, as authority.

"Villa smuggles over 60 per cent of his munitions," Dr. Altendorf said "If that part of his supplies were 'cut off he would be forced out of business"


