The tentative agreement reached Saturday on the question of collective bargaining was shattered when the employer's group insisted on adding to the substitute resolution declaring for the right of "employers by morning. Previous to the introduction of the "individual bargaining" clause an apparent solution to the problem had been reached. The original Russell-Endicott resolution, providing for the recognition of the right to collective bargaining and the right of employes to choose their representatives at will, was revamped, divided into four sections and amended to read "the right to organize into trade and labor labor organizations the right to choose representatives without restrictions was amended to read "by

representatives chosen by a majority of their own members." The compromise measure a

amended met with the approval of the labor and public groups and some members of the employers' wing when brought before the committee. Later, however, the employyers insisted on the addition of a fifth section, the individual bargaining clause which was promptly vetoed central committee deadlocked just as it was when the conference adjourned Friday.
