

Definite plans for the standardization of the course of study and equipment for home economics in Texas have been formulated by the state home economics committee, appointed by Miss Annie Webb Blanton, state superintendent of public instruction. AID IS URGED FOR **RED CROSS ABROAD**

President Wilson Prepared Message Before Illness.

WORK YET TO BE COMPLETED

To Finance Operations and to Garry Out Constructive Plans in Eastern Europe, Organization Requires Increasing Membership.

Washington, D. C.-Before his present illness President Wilson prepared the following message, in which he urges the people of the United States to generously respond to the third roll call of the Red Cross:

As president of the United States and as president of the American Red Cross I recommend and urge a generous response to the Third Red Cross Roll Call, which opens on November the second with the observance of Red Cross Sunday and appropriately closes on November the eleventh, the first anniversary of the signing of the armistice.

Twenty millfon adults joined the Red Cross during the war, prompted by a patriotic desire to render service to their country and to the cause for which the United States was engaged in war. Our patriotism should stand the test of peace as well as the test of war, and it is an intelligently patriotic program which the Red Cross proposes, a continuance of service to our soldiers and sailors, who look to it for many things, and a transference to the problems of peace at home of the experience and methods which it ac quired during the war.

Stress on Membership. It is on membership more than money contributions that the stress of the present campaign is laid, for the Red Cross seeks to associate the people in welfare work throughout the land, especially in those communities where neither official nor unofficial provision has been made for adequate

public health and social service. It is in the spirit of democracy that the people should undertake their own welfare activities, and the National the energies of the organization be- nineteen years. Handy tin boxes of 12 fare agencies.

The American Red Cross does not purpose indefinite prolongation of its relief work abroad, a policy which would lay an unjust burden upon our own people and tend to undermine the self-reliance of the peoples relieved, but there is a necessary work of completion to be performed before the American Red Cross can honorably withdraw from Europe. The congress of the United States has imposed upon the Red Cross a continuing responsibility abroad by authorizing the secretary of war to transfer to the American Red Cross such surplus army meddietary foodstuffs now in Europe as shall not be required by the army, to be used by the Red Cross to relieve the distress which continues in certain countries of Europe as a result of the

Program Deserves Support. To finance these operations, to conclude work which was begun during paratively inexpensive constructive plans for assisting peoples in eastern Europe to develop their own welfare organizations, the American Red Cross requires, in addition to membership ing the war.

Both the greater enduring domestic program and the lesser temporary foreign program of the Red Cross deserve enthusiastic support, and I venture to hope that its peace-time membership will exceed rather than fall below its impressive war membership, WOODROW WILSON.



MEXICAN FISHERMEN SLAY U.S. AVIATORS

BODIES OF FLYERS BROUGHT TO SAN DIAGO ABOARD AM-ERICAN DESTROYER.

MURDERERS BEING

Identity of Men Who Killed Flyers Known and Steps Being Taken to Effect Their Capture.

San Diego, Cal.-It is officially announced here that Lieutenants Cecil H. Connolly of San Diego and Frederick B. Waterhouse of Weister, Idaho. army aviators, missing since Aug. 21, were slain in Lower California by two Mexican fishermen.

The announcement was made upon the arrival here of the destroyerAaron Ward, bringing the bodies of the two aviators from Bahaia Los Angeles on the gulf of Lower California, to which point they had flown, losing their way in a border patrol flight from Yuma, Ariz., to San Diego.

According to Major R. S. Bratton, head of the military party sent here to recover the bodies, the slayers were from a Mexican sloop, their identity is known to the United States and Mexican government and steps are being taken to capture them.

The destroyer also brought a part of a story of the sufferings endured by the young aviators, in the form of notes scrawled in part on the wings and fuselage of their De Haviland airplane, in which Connolly and Waterhouse made their last flight. Some of these messages, evidently written when the aviators had almost lost hope of being found, were of such a tragic nature that Major Bratton asked the newspaper reporters to refrain from using them, out of consideration for the officers' families.

BOLSHEVIKI CONSIDER **EVACUATING RUSSIA**

Denekine Says Plan is to Abandon Moscow and Withdraw to Turkestan,

London.-The bolsheviki are considering the evacuation of soviet Russia, according to reports reaching General Denekine. The reported plan is for the removal of the cabinet to Tashkend after the abandonment of Moscow and the withdrawal of troops

on all fronts to Turkestan. Helsingfors One dispatch predicted that if Tula, 120 miles south of Moscow, was taken, the bolshevik commissaries would abandon their present capital and retire into Turkestan.

Recent reports from General Denekine's front announced that the soviet forces had begun to fortify the suburbs of Tula, War Minister Trotsky having declared that a general battle must be fought outside that town.

RAILROAD MEN DEFY ANTI-STRIKE MEASURE

Would Precipitate Revolution, President of Brotherhood Tells Congress

Washington.-Timothy Shea has no tified congress that the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, of which he is acting president, would not observe pending nati-strike legislation if enacted into law.

Such an attempt to single out railroad employes and deprive them of what he termed the economic right of workers to strike to prevent injustice. must be accepted, he said, in connection with other information which the railroad brotherhoods have, as a foregone conclusion that the railroads contemplate a general reduction in wages when the government surrenders control, and desire such a measure to forestall a strike.

New Orleans Sugar Shortage.

New Orleans, La.-New Orleans has gone back to war rationing of sugar, Restaurants have removed sugar bowls from the tables and grocers hold onto what they have. Most stores are entirely out and those that had a little sugar allowed only regular customers to get one and two pounds. Hotels are dopping the two spoonfuls in the codee before serving. With this condition staring the city in the face and with the public howling for sugar, the first shipment of 331 barrels of plantation yellow arrived from the M. J. Kohoa plantation, near Port Allen, and sold on the exchange for the record price of 201/2c per pound. About the same time a large catering firm was forced to secure a small quantity of sugar, and they paid a wholesale. house 221/2c for it.

Spanish Employers Declare Lockout Madrid.—The congress of Spanisa employers, sitting at Barcelona declared a general lockout of workmen throughout Spain. The lockout order will be effective Tuesday, Nov. 4.

Co-operation of the four big railroad brotherhoods and the farmers of the country, as well as the labor organizations of Canada, probably will be sought at was said; in furthering whatever program the union chiefs decide upon.

Mr. Gompers' announcement was contained in a telegram to the Illinois Federation of Labor at Peoria. His message was in reply to one in which the Illinois organization asked that a special convention of the American Federation of Labor be called to perfect an alliance of the international unions of the United States and Canada and the railroad protherhoods "more effectively to fight out the life and death struggle of the workers now

Mr. Gompers, in withdrawing or ganized labor's representatives from the conference, warned the employers' group that when they met in conference again with the spokesmen of union labor they would be glad to talk collective bargaining.






