

GOOD ARRANGEMENT OF ROADWAYS ON ANY FARM WILL SAVE BOTH TIME AND LABOR

Good-road building, like charity, should begin at home. This is another over which the farmer's product is hauled to market.

In proportion to its use a poor prirate road to a farm is as great a handicap to efficient marketing as well as other farm operations, as a poor public highway. The fundamental principle involved in the construction of the two kinds of roads is the same, according to the bureau of public roads of the United States department of agriculture. But, as the farm road is called on to bear far less traffic, the ordinary methods of construction and use of materials so adapted as to meet the special requirements and reduce greater traffic, in general, would be a useless waste of money. -

The first consideration is the location of the roads and paths about the farm. The roads and paths are a part of the permanent farm plant. Consethe same time should avoid, as much viding outlets and getting the water as possible, places which would require difficult and expensive construction or maintenance. The main consideration, however, must be to secure the highest degree of efficiency

from the farm plant as a whole. Ideal Arrangement of Lanes. an Jdeal arrangement of farm buildings as well as of connecting lanes and drives, offers helpful suggestions to the farmer who is planning new vehicle ways in the immediate vicinity of his farmhouse. This particular arrangement is for a farmstead occupying a corner lot, which permits a second, or rear, entrance from the public highway, this lane, running to the foresight in the alignment of ditches, north, shown at the right side of the in that the animals need not be driven past the house, thereby subjecting period. shrubs, trees and the lawn to possible damage. One feature that should be taken into consideration in planning the roads near the farmhouse is the di-rection of the prevailing winds. In this instance the main entrance lane and drive have been located to the north of the house, so that dust from them will ordinarily be carried away from the dwelling.

The earth road is the most common type of farm road and will probably so remain. When properly crowned, drained and maintained with the splitlog drag or other similar device, the earth road, on all but a few exceptional soils or in a few places immediately around the farm lots and buildngs, can be made to answer the requirements fairly well. A little grading will in general give the earth road a crown sloping from the center toward the side ditches at the rate of about one inch to the foot, and side ditches of sufficient size to carry away the storm water can usually be constructed without difficulty. If the be made deeper, or the ground water may be carried away by tile drains.

Good Drainage Essential. The fundamental requirement of an earth road is always good drainage. This involves, first, the removal of the water which reaches the surface of the road from precipitation of otherwise; and second, in certain places the removal of any ground water which reaches the road from underground seepage. Surface drainage is accomplished by securing a reasonable firm crowned roadway and providing litches of sufficient size and with ample grade and frequent outlets. Sublrainage to remove the water from beneath the foad surface or to prevent its passage into the roadbed is Hole in Ground, Wood, Concrete or usually accomplished most effectively by so-called blind drains or by means of properly located tile drains.

FEDERATION MEETING SUPPORTS STRIKERS

COUNCIL HOLDS INJUNCTION "SO AUTOCRATIC AS TO STAGGER THE HUMAN MIND."

AID OF PUBLIC WILL BE ASKED Lever Act Said Never to Have Been

Intended to Apply to Workers and Used Term Unjust

Washington.-Holding that the action of the government in the injunction proceedings against striking bituminous coal miners to be "so atuocratic as to stagger the human mind," the executive council of the American Federation of Labor has declared in a statement issued after a four-hour meeting that the miners' walk out was justified, promied for the strikers the entire support of organized labor and asked aid and indorsement for it

from the general public. The Lever act, under which the government acted in the court proceedings, never was enacted to apply to workers, the council asserted, and its use against the miners was classed as "an injustice not only to workers, but to all liberty loving Ameri-

cans." The action was taken without the participation of William Green, general secretary of the mine workers, who is a member, but all the remaining principal officers of the American

Federation of Labor were present. "By all the facts in the case the miners' strike is justified, we indorse We are convinced of the justice of the miners' cause. We pledge to the miners the full support of the American Federation of Labor of our country to give like indorsement and aid to the men engaged in this momentous struggle."

EIGHTY ACRES SWEPT BY FIRE IN OIL DISTRICT

Man Killed and Damage Exceeding \$100,000 Caused at Waggoner City

Wicitat Falls, Texas.-One man was killed, several were more or less seriously burned, half of Waggoner City was destroyed and more than \$1,000,raked eighty acres of the northwest | monia, extension of the Burkburnett oil field, the largest producing oil field in America, Sunday. The fire was caused by lightning striking and exploding an oil tank belonging to the Apple-Dunlap-Bell company in block 84, on the outskirts of Waggoner City.

The main street of the town, which has about 12,00 inhabitants, and is the largest unincorporated settlement in America, was a sheet of water on account of the recent incessant rains. Down this natural carrier the burning oil waves flowed, searing everything they touched. Between 40 and 50 structures, including nearly all of the business section, were destroyed. Among them was the new home of the Waggoner bank.

A thousand people are made homeless at Waggoner City as a result of the fire. A pouring rain, which set in soon after the fire began, added to the discomforts of the sufferers, but could do nothing to check the off fire, because oil burns easily on the surface of water.

INDUSTRIAL CENSUS IS TO BE MADE IN TEXAS

Three Zones Created for Gathering Information During Coming Census

Washington-Three industrial zones will be established in Texas for the purpose of taking the industrial census with the decennial enumeration beginning next January, as a result of a conference between officials of the census bureau and Representatives for failure to feed or other signs of Sumners and Lanham, and G. S. Maxwell, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce and Manufacturers' association of Dallas. They will be the Dallas-Fort Worth zone, the Houston-Galveston zone and the San Antonio

It has been the policy to take the industrial enumeration throughout the counties, without regard to sections, of large manufacturing production. This year the county census is to be made as usual, but in the zones the inquiry will be somewhat more complete and go into greater detal.

Expenses Lowest Since June, 1917 Washington.-Secretary Glass has announced that during October the ordinary and special disbursements of the government amounted to \$576,-\$49,205, the lowest since June, 1917.

CARE FOR VACCINATED HOGS

Lack of Proper Attention Has Result ed in Material Losses Which May Be Avoided.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Improper care of hogs following their immunization against hog cholera, administered in public stock yards and after arrival at their destination, has resulted in losses which may be materially decreased. The following instructions for the prevention of losses are valuable:

"Shipments should be made promptly after immunization, or should be delayed for not less than ten days. Truck hauls and shipments not exceeding 36 hours in length can be made promptly to advantage.

"Avoid crowding; allow stocker hogs relatively more floor space than fat

"It is important that drinking water be constantly accessible to the hogs, except in severe winter weather. If the car does not contain special water devices, a water trough, protected by slats over its top, should be securely fastened to the floor.

"Little or no feed is necessary during the 24 hours following inoculation, but clean water should be accessible. Short-haul shipments need not be fed

"When hogs arrive at their destination they should not be driven over the roads, but hauled from the car to the farm in wagons or trucks. Load and unload gently. Avoid chasing and unnecessary excitement in handling. In summer, unload where there is natural woodland shade or shelter pens; in winter, where there are suitable clean, bedded houses.

fresh pasturage. If alfalfa or other eguminous pasture is not available, a supplemental concentrate should be supplied. If no pasture, use self-feeders for soaked oats, and separate ones for tankage or other protein concentrate. At the end of two weeks begin gradually to change to the permanent ration. Keep fresh, clean water always available.

"Watch your hogs carefully each day disease or sickness. Have a quarantine pen and place sick hogs in it promptly.

"Short rations and a laxative may be used for slightly sick hogs. "The appearance of any disease in

which a number of hogs are similarly affected requires immediate expert advice and treatment. Consult your veterinarian."

REDUCE LOSS BY CHOLERA

Farmers Must Organize in Determined Effort Consisting of Self-Imposed Quarantine.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Permanent reduction in losses from cholera, says the United States department of agriculture, can be expected only when farmers organize in a determined effort consisting principally of self-imposed quarantine, the continuous employment of sanitary measures and the early use of the serum treatment should the herd become infected or dangerously exposed.

PREVENT CROWDING OF PIGS

Properly Constructed Feed Trough Will Permits Each Little Porker to Get His Share.

Young pigs should be given their feed in such a manner that each individual pig gets its share. The simplest way to accomplish this is to allow the pigs to eat from a properly constructed feed trough, one that will keep the pigs out of the feed and will lessen the possibility of crowding







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made that road overseers in this county are failing to comply with the following penal articles and to the end that they may be observed, the same cloud thereon be removed; that writ mark if the thread of the stream are herewith printed in verbatim:

Art. 828. If any overseer of a pubfail, peglect or refuse to perform any executed the same duty imposed upon him by law or shall fail, neglect or refuse to keep (L.S.) the roads, bridges and causeways in his precinct or district clear of obstructions and in good order or shall willfully suffer such roads, bridges or causeways to remain uncleared and out of repair for twenty days at a time he shall be fined not less than ten nor more than twenty-five collars.

Art. 829.
