The recent strike and the so-called ear-shortage are being used by the cotton gamblers and speculators to break the market and scare the farmers into selling their cotton for any price that may be offered. This scheme is used to justify the present bear raid.

Farmers, when the gamblers put the price is down, quit selling; do not sell a bale on a declining market, but hold for 45 cents, and make it plain that you are going to hold for the farmers' price. Grouping or collective selling is a good rule, provided you use your collective power to secure your fixed price. The County Attorney is in receipt of the following:

October 30, 1919, Honorable Chas. C. Triplett, County Attorney Graham, Texas.

Dear Sir: We have your communication of October 22nd addressed to this Department in which you submit the following inquiry:

"Where a survey calls for the bank of a river does that mean the first or second bank of the river?"

Your inquiry is for the purpose of determining who owns certain pecan trees on the bank of the Brazos river -the public or private individuals.

In reply thereto, I will refer you to some facts of an opinion prepared on a similar subject by Mr.Smedley, formerly of this Department. The question under discussion in the opinion was what constitutes the boundary of Texas along Sed river. In discussing same the writer says:

"It is a general rule that when the bank of a stream is described as the boundary the title will extend to the margin of the stream unless there is something to limit it to the top of the bank. See Farnhan on Water and Water Rights, Section 657 and the cases there cited. See also, Nelson vs. McCormick, 15 N. Y. 296; Yates vs. Van BeRogart, 36, N. Y. 626; Lamb vs. Rickets, 11 Chic. 311; Fleming vs. Ramsey, 27 Ky. 155.

"The ordinary meaning of the word 'bank' is the elevation of land which confines the river at ordinary high water, or the elevated land between ordinary high and ordinary low water. See Daniels vs. Cheshire, R. Co. 26 N. H. 85; Stone vs. City of Augusta, 46, Me. 127; Johnson vs. Enott, 13 Oregon, 308; 10 Pac. 418; Sundial Ranch vs. Hay Land Co., 61 Oregon, 205; 119 Pac. 768. Houghton vs Chicago, etc., Ry. Co., 47 Iowa, 370.

"In the language of some of the authorities, 'the banks of a river or stream are understood to be that which contains it in its ordinary state of high water.' See Minor's heirs vs. City of B. O. 115 L. A. 391; 38 So. 999. Ensley Development Co. rs. Powell, 147 Ala. 300; 40 So. 137. "The banks of a stream immediate

ly adjacent to its bed. The banks confine the waters within the bed." The point clearly made in the above is that where the bank of a stream is designated without other objects to fix the exact boundary of a piece of land, it is meant the margin of the stream. Of course we understand that in the Brazos river, as in any other western streams, the water does not follow any fixed line in the bed of the stream but shifts with the the seasons. Our construction of the

bank would be, as set out above, that part of the soil or land that confines the waters of the stream at ordinary flood, and by the margin of your stream, as used above, it yould mean that portion of the bed of the stream. that would measure the water in the river at ordinary mean low water mark if the thread of the stream were adjacent to the bank.

I think the quotations from the opinion above will clearly advise you on the question at issue.




