EPIDEMIC OF INFLUENZA

NEWCASTLE HOTEL BURNS

JUDGE W. N. BONNER SENDS RESIGNATION TO GOVERNOR

Judge W. N. Bonner Saturday wired his resignation as judge of the Thirtieth district court to Governor Hobby. His resignation is to take effect as soon as his successor can be appointed and qualify. Appointment of his successor is expected to be announced by Governor Hobby Monday. Judge Bonner will return to the practice of law in Wichita Falls.

Several promising attorneys of the district are being mentioned and urged for the appointment by their friends. Among those mentioned are Judge P. A. Martin and H. F. Weldon of Wichita Falls, W. E. Forgy of Archer City, Jelge P. M. Stine and J. C. Chestnut of Henrietta and R. F. Arnold of Graham.

The district is comprised of Wichita Clay, Archer and Young counties and forms one of the most important judicial districts of the state. Judge Bonner is the third judge to resign from the judgeship in the district. First Judge P. A. Martin resigned and was succeeded by Judge Elgar Scurry, who served out the unexpired term. Next Judge Akin was elected but resigned after serving a portion of his term. Judge Bonner was appointed to fill the unexpired term and was reelected to the place at the following regular election.

When appointed to the bench Judge Bonner had just passed his majority and was the youngest district judge in Texas and probably in the United States at that time. He has occupied the bench with much credit to himself and has made a good record as public servant. Further than to announce that he will resume private practice he has not announced his plans, but it is understood that he will again be in partnership with his brother, Joutte Bonner.

MAN CHOKED ON MEAT SOUNDS FIRE ALARM

A run by the fire department in response to the actions of a man in his efforts to dislodge a piece of meat from his throat, has probably established a new use for the fire fighting apparatus.

ANTI-FREEZE SOLUTIONS

There are three substances in general use for making anti-freeze solutions, each of which can be prepared by the owner of the auto. Alcohol is probably the most popular of all anti-freeze agents. Glycerine has proved very effective but the cost during the war made its use almost prohibitive. Calcium chloride is the most easily prepared solution and is widely used; but calcium chloride is dangerous to use. The commercial product is highly injurious, because of the action on the components of the cooling system.

A summary of the opinions of motor car manufacturers as to the value of various anti-freezing solutions shows a decided preference for alcohol and glycerin.

If 96 per cent alcohol is used the following solution will be found adequate for all ordinary temperatures:

Alcohol 1 part, water 3, will freeze 10 above.

Alcohol 1 part, water 2, will freeze at zero.

Alcohol 1 part, water 1, will freeze 20 below zero.

Neutral glycerin does not act on metal, but does act on rubber connections. If used the hose connections should be examined frequently to prevent disintegration and consequent leaks. It can be prepared as follows:

Glycerin 1 part, water 3, will freeze at zero.

Glycerin 1 part, water 2, will freeze at 10 above.

Glycerin 2 parts, water 1 will freeze at 20 below.

The unbleached variety of glycerin which may be procured at practically any drug store, is not only cheaper but the best.—Dallas News.

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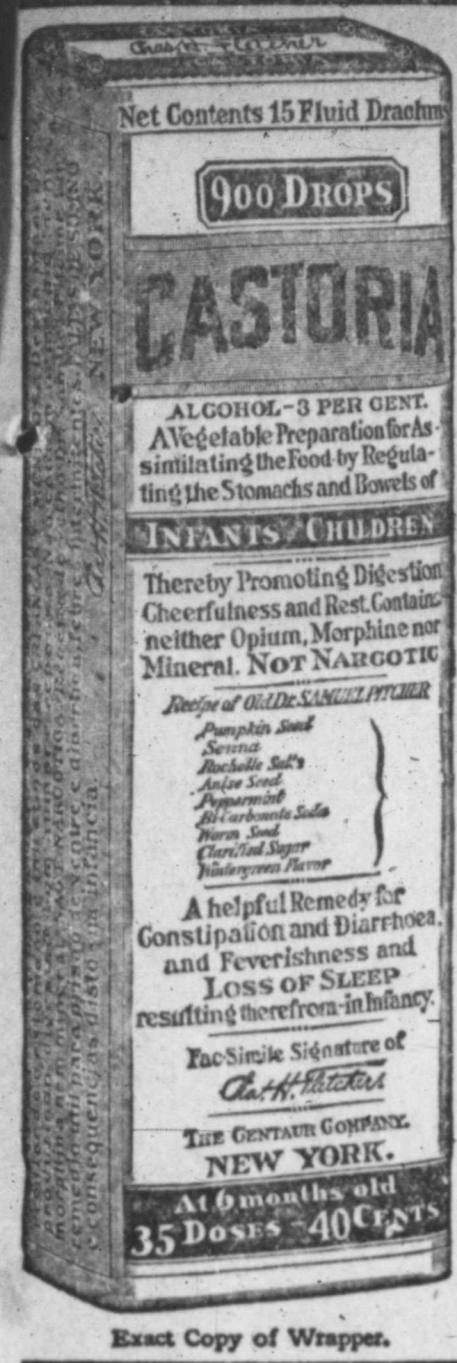

U. S. OUGHT TO LOOK AHEAD
Country Could Well Afford Hard Sur-
faced System of 50,000 Miles—
An Economic Asset.

It is possible to build a hard-sur-
faced highway system of 50,000 miles
so located as to serve directly 46 per
cent of all the counties of the United
States and indirectly 41 per cent of all
the others. For an annual expenditure
of \$100,000,000—hardly \$1 a person per

half years, and it would serve 87 per

Wealth in North Dakota.
According to United States government statistics the agricultural products of North Dakota have increased about \$278,000,000 since 1915, making a per capita wealth in the state of \$2,966 at the close of 1918. The United States census bureau estimates the per capita wealth of the entire Union at \$1,556, so that the average wealth in North Dakota is more than \$1,000 greater than the average for the whole Union. Including horses, cattle, hogs, sheep and creamery products, the agricultural production of the state at the close of 1918 was valued at about \$638,000,000. The same production at the close of 1915 was valued at about \$260,000,000.

Worth Paying Premiums For.
A \$5,000 life insurance policy was taken out on a hen exhibited in Portland, Ore., recently. This hen is a White Leghorn, owned by Doctor Tancore of Kent, Wash. She set a world's record for production by laying 330 eggs in 365 days ending September 16. This is about four times the production of the average hen. Her owner consented to allow her to be placed on exhibition by one of the poultry feed companies, but stipulated that she must be insured for \$5,000.

Hard-Surfaced Roads Facilitate Movement of Motor Trucks Handling Traffic Railroads Cannot Accommodate.

The growing needs of the country demand that some such comprehensive highway system be constructed," says Robert F. Black, Chicago manager of a large motor truck concern.
"In the past there has been too great a lack of foresight on the part of the road builders. They have lacked vision to foresee the requirements of even five years ahead. A road built today must be built, not with the idea of present traffic but that of ten years in the future."
"The growing need of the day is for transportation. We have simply got to provide it. We cannot stop it and the sentiment of the country will not tolerate any handicap of our transportation system."
"With each year the railroads are becoming more and more inadequate. Motor transportation is a growing economic necessity, a fact that is being recognized more and more each day as motor trucks are called upon to handle traffic that the railroads cannot accommodate."
"Estimates prepared by engineering authorities show that the United States could afford to spend \$1,250,000,000 on a hard-surfaced road system of 50,000 miles which would serve directly and indirectly 87 per cent of the population of the entire country. Not only would such a system be an economic asset that would pay for itself many times over, but its construction would provide work for many thousands of people for a number of years, and in that respect alone would have great business value to the country in general."
"War increases business to replace the great losses of destruction; but the development of a nation in times of peace provides a more normal and healthy market for labor and material that can be made a stabilizer of business and industrial conditions."
"A well planned national highway system is a necessity, and as soon as the nation can complete the plan conditions will force putting it into operation."
