

LARGE INFLUENCE OF MALES

Selection of Roosters to Increase Egg Production Is Urged by Poultry Specialists.

Although poultry experts have long advocated culling non-producing hens. poultry workers at the coffege of Agriculture at Ithaca now advise the selection of roosters to increase egg production, according to an article in the Cornell Countrymen. From experiments extending back for more

The difference in the appearance of males is comparable to the difference in the rate of growth and the intensity. with which hens lay, according to the college. Some hens can lay an egg once in every 24 hours; others are not able to produce an egg oftener than once in 48 hours, although both have the same care and feed. If one hen can lay faster than another, it indimales as foundations of high-produc-

A rooster to father egg-laying offspring should grow rapidly and mature quickly. He should appear deep bodled and short legged, full in breast and abdomen with a flat, wide back. lost actually by wasteful power work- His head should be moderately short, set on a large full neck, and with prominent eyes. A good male for breeding is friendly, courageous and proud of himself, calling attention to his pride by frequent crowing.

MAKE HEN FLOCK PROFITABLE

With Possible Exception of Leghorns Fowls Over Two Years Old Do Not Pay to Keep.

It seldom pays to keep hens for laying after they are two and one-half years old. This may not be true of Leghorns but is generally so of most other breeds. Hens older than this may return some profit but younger hens will return greater profits. In this day of high-priced feed, culling will make poultry more profitable.

VARIETY OF FEED ESSENTIAL

Every Flock of Hens Must Be Supplied With Necessary Material to Manufacture Eggs.

Every flock of hens is an egg factory. Like any other factory the flock can be given the best materials in the world to work on and still fail to produce enough to pay for running the plant. Good feed in sufficient variety is necessary for egg production, but the ability to manufacture eggs from feed must be there first.

COLONY HOUSE IS PREFERRED

Give Poultryman Chance to Raise His Fowls Under Ideal Conditions-Must Keep Clean.

Colony houses on free range give the poultryman a chance to raise his birds under ideal conditions. But the same sanitary precautions must be taken as with laying houses. The small houses must be frequently cleaned and sprayed and the roosts painted with kerosene or some lice paint to keep down the red mites.

NO PROFIT IN POOR LAYERS

Unprofitable Preducers Should Be Culled Out to Save High-Priced Feed and Labor.

It pays to cull out the poor layers any time, to save the feed anl labor they cost, but to make a profit on them it is best to cull in late summer ar early fall, before the rush of spring chickens lowers the market price of



NEED FOR BETTER HIGHWAYS

Freight Congestion on Railroads Has Emphasized Importance of Our Country Roads.

We are being treated to as demonstration of what happens when the arteries of commerce become diseased, congested and run down. The lack of adequate transportation facilities on the railroads of this country mounts into the millions of dollars in the delays that are occasioned. Our rallway system, like our agricultural methods, have grown up so gradually, keeping abreast, even ahead of the demands of commerce, we have come to look upon them as a matter of course. But the even balance between transportation facilities and demands of commerce is easily upset, as the experience of the past few months has demonstrated.

Our railroad system needs rehabilitation. But along with the improve-

ments of the railroads there is great need for a material improvement throughout the land. Over the country roads move the raw materials that go to make up a vast proportion of the tonnage carried by the railroads. The present freight congestion has emphasized the importance of the country road. It has proved the value of hard surface roads as passageways for freight carried in motortrucks and automobiles.

Much relief for the railroads has come through the immense tonnage that has moved this summer on motor trucks. A greater tonnage would undoubtedly have moved in the same manner if our highway system had been fit. The time has come when the mileage of concrete, brick or other hard-surfaced roads must extend in an ever-increasing network until the remotest parts of the country can have the advantage of quick transportation every day of the year in a motor vebicle .- American Fruit Grower.

ROCK FOR HIGHWAY BUILDING

First Systematic Efforts to Determine Value Were Made in French Laboratory in 1878.

The first systematic attempts to determine the value of rock for road building purposes by means of laboratory tests were made in France, where in 1878 a road materials laboratory was founded in the French School of Bridges and Roads. Here the Deval abrasion test was adopted, and this test with slight modification has been accepted as standard throughout the United States. The test is named from its inventor. It was first used in connection with contract work in the city of Paris. Many valuable data were collected in this laboratory on the hardness and toughness of rock, and tests for these properties were developed which were, in principle, the same as those in use today.

ARGUMENT FOR GOOD ROADS

Judgment Rendered Against County Because Culvert Was Obscured by Weed Patch.

An argument for good roads that carries with it a sharp punch in the way of a substantial judgment for damages is disclosed in a recent decision of the supreme court of Wisconsin. In this case it appears that when a machine went out of the trafhe path of an old-fashloned country road for the purpose of letting a tractor pass it struck the cement curbing at the end of a culvert which crossed the road at this point. Being covered with weeds the obstruction was not seen until the accident occurred. The county was held liable in damages for the accident.





Littleleld, Austin financier-philanthropist, ex-Confederate soldier, ranchman and a friend of the University of Texas, who died at his home in this city at 1 o'clock this morning, nad an interesting career. He had enjoyed distinctions above the average man, his achievements in the world of affairs have been large, and with it all he had borne himself as an unassuming, modest, kind-hearted man. Major Littlefield's death followed an illness dating back two years, and his passing was not unexpected. With him at the time of his death were his wife, H. A. Wroe of Austin and Dr. Whitfield Harral of Dallas, both of whom are nephews.

Major Littlefield, during his long residence in Austin, took particular interest in the University of Texas, and his gifts to that institution have been numerous, including the Wrenn Library, valued at \$250,000. Among his first gifts was the Littlefield fund for Southern history. He donated \$40,000 for the Jefferson Davis monument on the Davis homestead in Kenhmrrrr -eald ui SHRLU HR DLUU tucky. His latest gift to the University is a memorial arch, not yet erected, commemorating the deeds of University students in the world war, the \$300,000. For a number of years Major Littlefield served as a member of the board of regents of the University, resigning because of failing

Major Littfield was born in Panola county, Mississippi, on June 21, 1842. His parents were Flemming Little-

The future boy soldier and man of affairs spent his boyhood on the Gonzales county farm and obtained his schooling in the common schools of the county and at the Gonzales college. He was between 18 and 19 years of age when he enlisted in the Eighth to reside here until his death. promoted to a captaincy and as senior Captain of the regiment served as Major following the battle of Chickamauga, in September, 1863, until he was wounded at the battle of Mossy Creek (East Tennessee) Dec. 26,1863. The wound was a serious one, in the hip, caused by a bursting shelf, and kept the injured man on crutches until the summer of 1867.

There was a recompense in the fact that while he lay on the field he was promoted to the rank of Major for gallantry on the field. It was General Thomas Harrison who conferred this mark of recognition

In the meantime, while yet a Captain, he was sent to Texas on detached duty, and while on that errand was married to Miss Alice Tillar at Houston. This was on Jan. 14, 1863.

Major Littlefield in October, 1864, resigned his position in the army and returned to Gonzales county. Here he engaged in farming until 1871, raising cotton on the plantation. Overflows that came in the years of 1869 and 1870 proved disastrous, so that he abandoned cotton raising and in the spring of 1871 embarked in the cattle business with a capital of \$3,600 During the early years he drove many a herd overland to Kansas and what are now the States of the Northwest. In 1877 he established a ranch on the Canadian River in Oldham and Potter counties. This he sold in 1881 and the following spring established a ranch in Chaves county, N. M., which he still owns. In 1901 he purchased the Yellow House division of the Cauitol Syndicate land, consisting of 300,000 acres, which he still owns and vention program. pastures cattle upon.
