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TEXAS LEGISLATURE MEETS JAN. 12-REPRESENTATIVES

Austin, Texas, Dec. 18.-Texas lawmakers will be confronted by complex mass of problems when they assemblage in the Thirty-seventh legislature here on January 11, 1921. Already it appears obvious that the coming session, like those of several years past will terminate with a great deal of undisposd business on hand, and more legislative ability will be required to get bills considered than will be needed to get them enacted afey are taken up.

fork of the board of control in paring to reduce materially the utine work of legislature, and the fact that these budgets are expectd to be ready for considration at the beginning of the session, instead of at the end of the case when appropriation comittees worked them out, probably will make this session somewhat different from the past. However, appropriation committees have been returned, and department and institution hands are privileged to appeal from the allowances made by the board of control.

Enough legislation to keep the Assembly engaged for the entire session is suggested by the State Democratic platform alone and new members and bocoming officials are full of ideas, while many of the old members are nursing projects which met_defeat or were crowded out in past sessions.

Among the subjects which have been suggested for consideration with fair indications that they will be introduced are:

Suffrage, labor, judicial reform, attraction of industrial enterprises, taxation, reforms, state aid for home ownership, readjustment of state departments, and commissions, creation of public utilities commission, changes in the state department of agriculture and in the state bureau of markets and warehouse, redistricting of the tate laws promoting home and community life, health and sanitation reg lations, road building, conservation of natural resources, anti-Japanese legislation, provisions for public schools, normal colleges and the state university, blue sky laws, regulations for employment of convicts and crop financing proposals.

There will be 142 members in the house and 31 senators, presided over by Lieutnant-Governor Lynch Davidson, to consider these subjects. Though several candidates have announced for the speakership of the use there are no definite indications as to who will be chosen. R. E. Thomasson of El Paso, speaker during the past session, will not return.

The platform adopted by the state Democratic convention last summer demands that the legislature submit to the people a constitutional amend-American citizens, either native or fulto suffrage in this state.'

Labor questions wil be brought up under the injunction of this same platform that the legislature amend the minimum wage act so as to allow the fixing of minimum wages by districts and amend the workmen's compensation act so as to cure alleged defects. AN ORDINANCE

Regulating Electric Wiring and De fining the Powers and Duties of the City Electrician, and Providing Penalty for the Violation of the Provisions of such Ordinance.

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Graham:

Sec. 1. The City Electrician shall be elected annually by the City Council at their first meeting after the election and shall hold office for one year, or subject to the will of the Council, and until his successor is elected and qualified. He shall before entering upon the duties of his office take and subscribe to the official oath prescribed by the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 2. The rules and requirements of the National Board of Fire Underwriters for the installation of electrical wiring and apparatus, known as the National Electrical Code is hereby adopted, and recognized as standard authority on the subject of electric wiring and the installation of electric apparatus, and the City Electrician, in inspecting all electrical installations shall be governed there-

By the term "electric wiring" as used herein, is meant the installation of wires for the transmission of electric current on or in any building. for any purpose whatsoever or installing electrical devices, fixtures and apparatus of any description.

Section 3. All persons or firms er corporations desiring to engage in the electric wiring business in the City of Graham shall obtain from the City Secretary or other person authoried by the City Council to issue the same, a license, which shall run for a period of one year from the date of its issuance, unless sooner revoked by the City Council, and the same shall not be transferrable. The names of each and every member of any firm or co-partnership obtaining a Meense shall be given to the City Secretary, or other person authorized by the City Council to issue such license, and each of said names shall be inserted in said license, provided, however, that for each name in excess of one, so inserted in such license shall pay to the City Secretary or other person authorized to issue such license, the sum of Ten Dollars in addition to the amount hereinafter pro-vided to be paid.

Sec. 4. All persons or firms obtaining a license shall pay to the City Secretary or other person authorized by the City Council to issue such license the sum of Ten Dollars before said license shall be issued.

Sec. 5. It shall be the duty of ev-

ery person, firm or corporation doing any electric wiring in the City of Graham, to notify the City Electrician when said work is ready for inspection, and before any of said work is concealed, and while same is still accessible, that said work is ready for inspection. It shall be the duty of the City Electrician as soon as possible after receiving such notice and not later than twenty-four hours after said notice is given, to inspect such work and to ascertain whether or not same is in compliance with the rules laid down in said National Electrical Code, and if same is in compliance with the rules laid down in said Code he shall approve the same and shall issue to the person, firm or corporation doing such work a certificate of inspecting stating that such work has bees approved by the City Electrician, which certificate of inspection shall be by the person, firm er corporation doing such electric wiring delivered to the person for whom said work is done. Said inspection shall be paid for by the person doing such electric wiring and the City Electrician shall not issue any certificate of inspection until such fee shall have been paid. And no electric current shall be turned onto any wiring hereafter installed until such wiring shall have been inspected as herein provided for.

Sec. 6. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject upon conviction thereof, to a fine in any sum not to exceed One Hundred Dollars. And in addition therethe power, if it deems best, to declare forfeited the license granted under the provisions of this Ordinance, and 25 outlets to 50 outlets, concealed wirin such event no license shall be thereafter granted to any such person, firm or corporation to do electric wiring in the City of Graham, unless expressly authorized by the City Coun-

Sec. 7. Telephone and telegraph companies, installing wires for their own service, are exempt from the terms of this Ordinance.

Sec. 8. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent a person not engaged in electrical wiring as a business from doing his own wiring without a license, provided all such work must be inspected."

Sec. 9. The City Electrician shall be entitled to the following fees for YORK INVESTMENT COMPANY inspecting work:
