Funeral services were held at 2:30 p. m. Friday in the Cisco First Methodist Church, with burial in Oakwood Cemetery. Mr. Fry began raising regis-tered Polled Hereford stock in 1927. He was a partner in the M. E. Fry & Sons ranch in East-land and Callahan counties at the time of his death.

A native of Brown County, Mr. Fry was born Sept. 5, 1887. He and Mrs. Fry lived on a farm on Jim Ned Creek, near Grovesnor, in Brown County for a number of years before the Fry oil field was opened on their property. Edward H. Phelps of Abilene, will speak at the Callahan Co. Club meeting on Wednesday, July 19, at the Methodist church. Phelps succeeds the late Max Bentley, veteran Abilene news-paperman and West Texas CC publicist, who devoted several years to the financial welfare of Camp Sweeney and was one of its most consistent financia contributors. In 1942 the government purchased the ranch to become a part of Camp Bowle, and the Frys moved to Eastland County.
