Mr. Babb says it will be about the 10th of November before the plant will be ready to operate, but when the juice is turned on the people of Graham will know they have a real electric light plant and can be assured of the vety\_best service.

The plant will accommodate three times the number of lights now being used and not be loaded to its full capacity then. Around the whole county is an electric line on which runs an interurban car, propelled by electricity. The car starts at Graham, goes through Olney, Newcastle and Loving and just before it gets back to Graham gives the regular street car whistle.

The tunnel in the north part of the county is reproduced, together with the Brazos river and its meanderings. The bridges are made to correspond with the bridges now erected in the county and along the bank of the Brazos trees are shown growing; the Newcastle lake is cleverly reproduced with a mirror for the water and each town along the route is populated with little dolls, a full gross being used in the display.

This was built primarily to advertise the store of B. A. Snoddy & Co. but a look at the miniature county will prove interesting to any one who cares to see it.
