RUNS TAFT CLOSE RACE IN CINCINNATI, HOME OF PRESIDENT

Latest Returns Received Tuesday Night Indicate that Wm. H. Taft Has Carried but Nine States, Theodore Roosevelt Three, While Woodrow Wilson Has Large Majorities in all the Other States.

Associated Press dispatches Tuesday night indicated that Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey has been elected president by an overwhelming majority. The first reports had were from New York and Chicago. In New York Wilson led in both city and state, while Illinois went to Roosevelt.

All the New England states have been conceded to Wilson except Vermont, and the latest reports gave him the following states: New York, Massachusetts, Maryland, Virginia, Oregon, New Jersey, Arkansas, Mississippi, Maine, Connecticut, California, Tennessee, Kansas, Utah, Rhode Island, Indiana, Ohio, Nebraska, and only twenty-nine . man survey; consideration \$1800. votes behind Taft in New Hampshire.


