Austin, Nov. 16 .- According to State Treasurer J. M. Edwards' annual report, during the fiscal year ending Aug. 31, 1912, the state did a business amounting to \$36,092,194, having on hand in cash Sept. 1, 1911, \$647,bursing and transferring \$17, 973,122, and having on hand in cash the first of the new fiscal year \$793,417.
