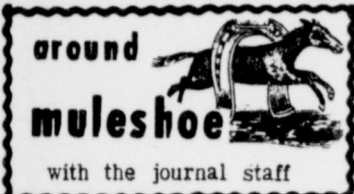

Lazbuddie Resident Receives Bronze Star

Specialist E-4 Juan J. Delgado of Lazbuddie received the Bronze Star Medal from the Department of Army in ceremonies before the 413th Civil Affairs Company here Saturday, February 15.

Presenting the award was LTC Billy C. Gunter, commander of the 413th Civil Affairs Company.

Delgado received the high award "for heroism in connection with ground operations against a hostile force" in the Dong Ha Valley of Vietnam. Delgado was serving with the 5th Cavalry when the unit came under an intense barrage of enemy small arms, automatic weapons, and rocket propelled grenade fire on April 6, 1970.

Delgado, at that time a PFC, maintained his position in the face of an enemy assault, and exposed himself to enemy fire in an effort to secure the resupply of ammunition for his vehicle.

Although he was the first to be severely wounded, Delgado remained behind his .50 caliber machinegun to repel the assault

with devastating fire. When his weapon jammed, Delgado continued to assist in the vital resupply of ammunition for the

remaining weapons.

Refusing evacuation, he continued in his efforts until the enemy withdrew.

The official citation notes that "PFC Delgado's personal courage and devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Army."

Mrs. Watson To Receive Award At TCTA Conference Feb. 20-22

Teachers from all corners of Texas will meet February 20-22 in Fort Worth for the 20th annual convention of the Texas Classroom Teachers Association (TCTA). Convention headquarters will be the Sheraton-Fort Worth Hotel.

Approximately 1,000 teacher delegates representing some 250 TCTA local associations and 50,000 TCTA members across the state will set the course of association business for another year.

Important business items for the 1975 Representative Assembly are voting on a dues increase proposal, electing a new slate of state officers, amendments to the constitution and bylaws, and adopting resolutions and goals for the coming year.

The proposed 110 resolutions cover such topics as curriculum and instruction, professional rights and responsibilities, legislation, teacher education and professional standards, and human relations.

Presiding over convention sessions will be TCTA Pres. Clay Henderson of Lubbock. He will be succeeded June 1 by TCTA Pres. - Elect Henrietta Blend of Houston.

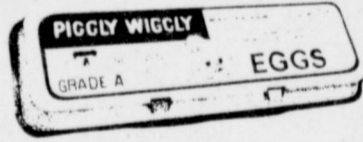

Following these items of business, the council held the public hearing on the 1975-76 city budget. This year, which begins April 1, there will be total appropriations of \$726,721.00. A cost of living raise to city employees is provided for in the budget amounting to about a 10 percent raise for employees.

Debts of \$525,000 will be retired, \$50,000 was for relocating the water lines for the widening of Highway 84, and \$475,000 was for water improvements.

Included in the new budget will be a raise in ad valorem taxes by 25 cents. The taxes will be increased, if the budget is adopted, from \$1.40 per one hundred valuation to \$1.65 per one hundred.

Easter Seal Appeal letters are being delivered this week according to Jimmie Crawford, the Bailey County Easter Seal Representative of the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas. The Representative serves as contact for disabled persons needing Easter Seal rehabilitation services and also serves as Treasurer of the Easter Seal Appeal in the County.

The Easter Seal Society offers physical and occupational therapy, speech and hearing programs, and special equipment loans to enable disabled persons to make the best use of their abilities to overcome handicaps. These services are financed by the annual Easter Seal Appeal and Fall Membership Drive.

The Society finances public education programs, provides scholarships for training of professional personnel to staff rehabilitation centers, and helps provide for National

research into the causes and cures of crippling conditions. Crawford pointed out that all these programs are important if Texas is going to continue to provide the best in rehabilitation services for its own disabled citizens.

During 1974, the Texas Easter Seal Society provided treatment and services for 20,152 children and adults who were in need of assistance. Easter Seal services are available to any disabled person who can benefit from help provided by the Easter Seal Society, and who do not qualify for any other assistance. Self-mailing requests for assistance are available through the Representative.


The Easter Seal Campaign will continue through Easter Sunday, March 30.

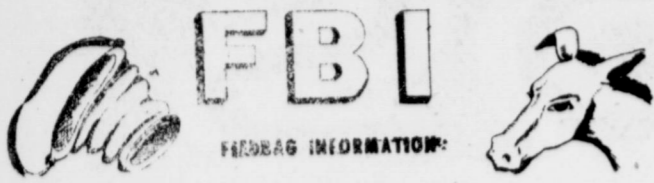

AUSTIN—Although the 64th Legislature has done little that is spectacular, it has managed to spend about a million dollars a day on the average during its first month of operation.

Since reporting for duty here January 14, lawmakers have passed so-called emergency measures totalling \$314.8 million. And work on the new biennial budget is just getting started good in House appropriations and Senate finance committees!

A significant part of the total—\$123.8 million for increased retirement benefits for state employees and school teachers—is contingent on adoption by voters of a Constitutional Amendment April 22.

The amendment would raise the ceiling on state matching contributions to the retirement systems. If voters won't permit that, the appropriation voted by lawmakers this month will be nullified.

One of the first of the appropriations bills speeded through both houses provides \$93 million for immediate pay raises to state employees. More raises will be included in the budget for the new 1976-77 fiscal period.

Another \$80 million was allocated as an emergency grant fund to aid school districts which are having a hard time making ends meet.

Another \$18 million went to the junior colleges which have been experiencing unexpected growth.

A variety of other smaller appropriations measures, totalling several million dollars more, are being acted on speedily.

HIGHWAY FUNDS FREED

President Ford announced he would free \$2 billion worth of impounded federal interstate highway funds to help provide jobs and fight the recession.

State Highway Department officials estimated \$150 million worth of projects can begin soon when the money is received.

Texas ordinarily contracts for \$30 million to \$50 million worth of projects monthly, but may take bids on \$150 million worth in March and April to get the newly-released funds.

Meanwhile, a federal judge in Washington held the President does not have the power to impound money appropriated to the states for highways by Congress.

Texas and 11 other states filed the lawsuit which brought the new ruling.

HILL BACKED

Atty. Gen. John Hill's lawsuit to block a \$45 million intrastate long-distance rate hike by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company won House of Representatives support.

Representatives voted 87-48 for a resolution encourag-

ing Hill to push forward with the action.

Rep. Jim Nugent of Kerrville said Hill is acting in an area without "specific statutory authority" and needs all the backing he can get.

Hill has challenged the increase on grounds that the rates proposed are too high. He won a temporary restraining order to halt the hike, and the case was set for hearing on his request for injunction early this week.

ENERGY PLAN OFFERED

Gov. Dolph Briscoe offered his own energy plan to President Ford in a meeting at Houston.

Included in the Briscoe plan are deregulation of the price of "old" oil, coupled with an excess profits tax. A "plowback credit" would

be given on funds used to develop new energy. Briscoe also suggested invoking the Defense Production Act of 1950 to increase the supply of tubular steel needed for drilling.

COURTS SPEAK

A federal district judge in Dallas refused to grant a temporary injunction to prevent the airline pilots union from ordering pilots to honor picket lines of Texas International Airlines strikers. The airline appealed to higher court.

The State Supreme Court held invalid an incorporation attempt of Tucker in Anderson County.

Texas Court of Criminal Appeals turned down the appeal for new trial of an osteopath in Garland who was convicted of selling barbiturates.

A pollution fine assessed an oil trucking company was reversed by the Court of Criminal Appeals.

The Third Court of Civil Appeals reversed a \$241,875 default judgment against an out-of-state man sued for failure to deliver diesel fuel on grounds he was not properly served with legal citations.

AG OPINIONS

Attorney General Hill held Texas Youth Council must accept juvenile aliens properly committed to its custody by courts as delinquents.

In other opinions, Hill concluded:

A county cannot contribute public funds for construction of a facility to be operated by a private livestock

Department of Labor and Standards officials have authority to arrest for Labor Agency Law violations but are not "peace officers" with right to carry pistols.

Valueless records may be disposed of by county clerks and recorders and the state librarian, and those which are not confidential can be transferred to a private party.

Information in a university student's job placement office must be disclosed to the student concerned.

Preston A. Stofer of Long Mott and A. C. Schwethelm of Comfort to the Guadalupe-Blanco River Authority board of directors and Donald W. Harris of San Antonio to the Advisory Council on Community Affairs.

State Rep. Anthony Hall of Houston and Nancy Perkins of Abilene were named chairman and vice chairman

of a new State Democratic Affirmative Action and Voter Participation Steering Committee. State Party Chairman Calvin Guest announced the appointments.

John Albach is the new regional director of the Texas office of the National Council on Crime and Delinquency.
