





Producers in need of once an application period Spring and Fall annually planted crops under the Program have until March 15 to apply for coverage on certain crops for which the catastrophic level of March 15. insurance is not regularly available, said Kim Hanlin, executive director for the Bailey County Farm Service Agency.



Why? He loves to be with the ones he loves.

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
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


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


My younger brother Jim now loves Louisiana. And he can learn more about it on the Internet on his computer or on the Discovery Channel on his high-def TV.
