

Mr. J. S. Criswell, manager of the Graham Mill & Elevator stated to a representative of this paper that he expected the market on new wheat to be from \$1.00 to \$1.25 a bushel, and possibly higher, and that with favorable seasons from now on this country will make more wheat than any previous

year of its history. The Reporter believes the wheat grower will be fortunate this year as there is already sufficient moisture in the ground to allow the wheat to head out, and with a rain at the proper time there will be an abundant yield.
