Circular Letter Sent Out by E.O. & W. Dumas Picnic Was a Big Success

The following letter has been sent out to the subscribers to E. O. & W. stock, and will prove of interest to everybody along the route as it shows the standing of the men making up the company which now has in hand the building and equipping of the road:—

Dalhart, Texas, July 6, 1909.

Gentlemen:—

I am enclosing herewith a copy of the assessment notice as is being mailed to all of the subscribers in Hutchinson, Hansford and Ochiltree counties, whose subscriptions are now due and payable, in accordance with the terms thereof by reason of the contract executed by me, on July 3rd, 1909, upon authority from the Board of Directors, providing for the sale of all our bonds which will be issued under permission from the State Railroad Commission, and for the construction of our line of road to Ochiltree by the Southwestern Construction Company, of New York City.

ARKANSAS PIONEER DEAD.

The following dispatch appeared in the Fort Smith American of June 20:

Fayetteville, Arkansas June 29.—Stephen K. Stone, one of the pioneers of Fayetteville and Washington county, died here this morning at 10 o'clock. Mr. Stone came to Fayetteville about 1844 and materially aided in the upbuilding of the city. He leaves an estate of \$500,000 to be divided between his wife, who survives him, and seven children. He was 90 years of age and highly respected.

Mr. Stone was the father of Messrs. Wm. and Robert Stone of Channing and the grandfather of Mrs. D. G. Locke of Channing, Mrs. C. T. Lambert of Hartly and Mrs. R. H. Beard of Dumas.
