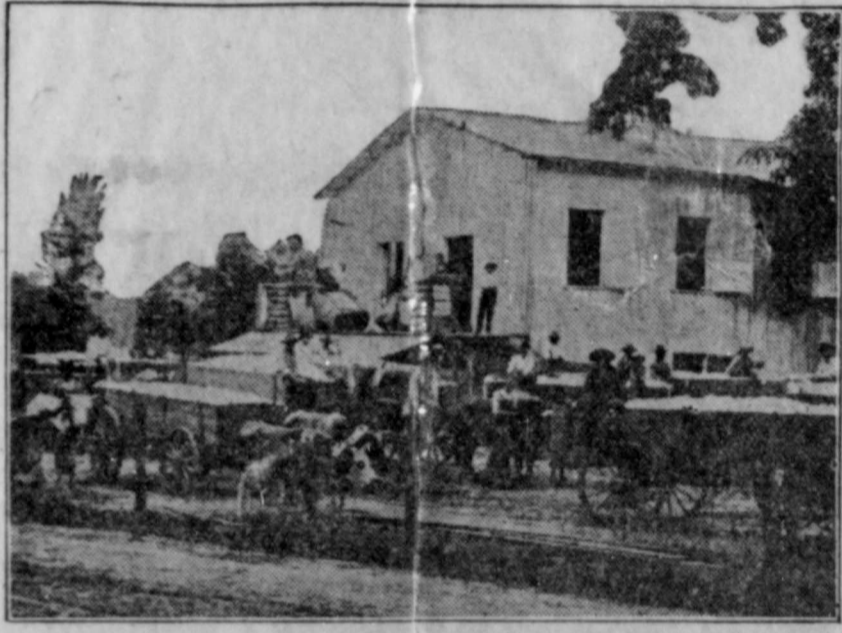


IMPROVING IN SOUTH

Many Farmers Now Raise Their Own Home Supplies.

Business Interests of Cotton States Now Realize Need as Well as Advantage of Better Methods and Diversified Crops.

Because the south's leading crop—cotton—has been bringing fancy prices for the past several years, it must not be taken for granted that all those who grow it have been piling up bank accounts. Some men have grown wealthy growing cotton, but the same may be said of corn growers, wheat growers, fruit growers or, in fact, men following any special line of work. Shrewd business sense and natural talents for good management will make a few men eminently successful at anything they may do. But let us get down to the rank and file of the cotton farmers, the little fellow who grows from two to twenty bales on his own or rented land. By way of parenthesis we will say that this class grows by far the larger portion of the great cotton crop each year. How do you find things with him? The old custom, as all know, has been to raise cotton and buy everything else used, food and clothing. The majority even depend on the furnishing merchant to let them have supplies to start the new crop in the spring. These merchants are not out for their health, of



Scene at a Southern Cotton Gin.

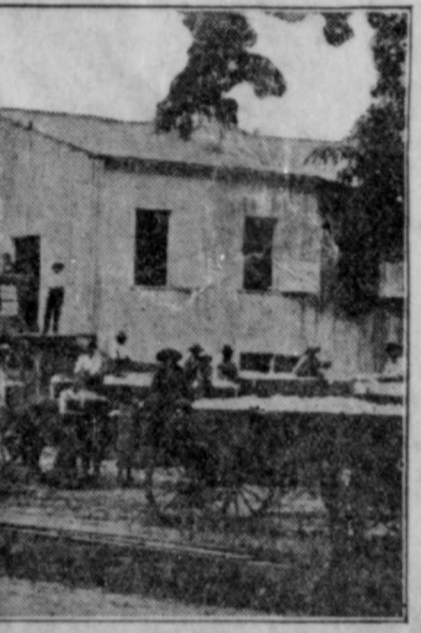
course, so the poor fellow places his faith in the merchant who offers him the best prices for the bare necessities of life, and at the end of the season pays up his supply bill for the year. If he is particularly fortunate, and perhaps has a few dollars left over which he soon spent too frequently not wisely. So it goes on from one year's end to another. When specially bad years come a little more restrictions are put on by the merchant and a little more deprivations and hardships for the poor fellow's family. He never seems to realize that with half the energy he could grow around him a better living than he is getting, and at the same time raise just as much cotton, which could be considered a surplus crop. Some are happily seeing the light and others will follow when the great mass of southern farmers raise their own home supplies, work stock for home use and have some to spare. When this transformation comes about we can truly call the attention of the outside world to the "New South."

Speaking of high prices for cotton, let us see how much there is to it. While cotton has advanced 100 per cent, or more from its lowest price, we must remember that food stuff and clothing have advanced from 100 per cent to 250 per cent in the same time. Mules that could be bought fifteen years ago for \$100, are now bringing from \$200 to \$300, and nearly every-

thing the farmer has to buy has advanced much more than the commodity upon which he depends to pay for all, so what has the farmer gained who has followed in the old ruts?

When the lands were more fertile and there were fewer insect pests to ravage the growing crops, and the seasons were apparently more propitious, there was not so much necessity for the adaptation of better methods. The old cotton system, together with careless, or it might be said, criminal, treatment of the soils has forced upon the farmer a burdensome tax in the way of fertilizers to be used in growing the crop. In one state last season there was a fertilizer bill of \$17 against every bale of cotton grown in the state. Add to this rent and other fixed expenses and see what an enormous sum is involved before one cent can be used to furnish the house, supply the place, or pay for the land.

The business interests of the cotton states have at last realized the needs as well as the advantages of the better methods. The merchants and bankers are fast requiring their customers to grow diversified crops enough to supply the home needs at least. This change will, of course, reduce the volume of business, but it will put things on a solid basis. And it is a poor business man who will not take a moderate profit as a surety rather than to look to the exorbitant rates surrounded with so many uncertainties, as has heretofore been the rule in the cotton sections. The farmer himself has begun to recognize the advantages of the change, and is now bending every effort to put into oper-

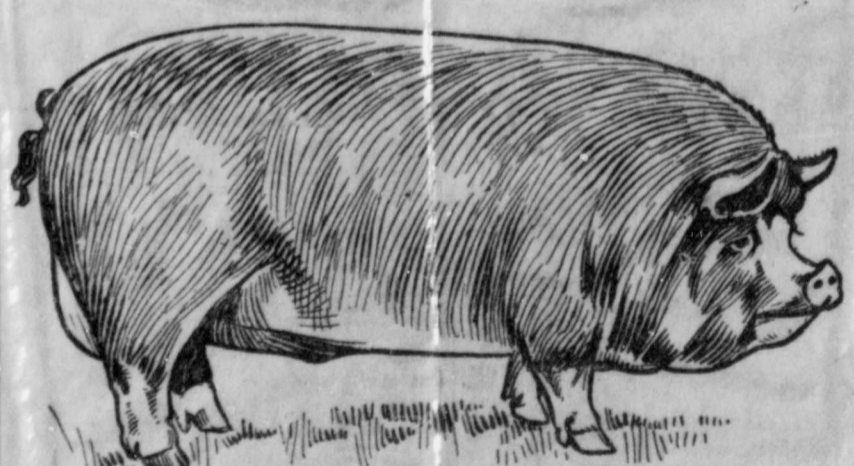


Scene at a Southern Cotton Gin.

ation the new methods in cotton raising. The state departments of agriculture, in co-operation with the state departments of agriculture and state experiment stations, have joined forces to aid the farmers in a general readjustment of the present system of cotton raising. The effects of the combined efforts are already noticeable in the marked increased yields of all the staple crops, the awakened interest in the production of home supplies, and an almost universal desire for better stock and farm implements. The farm house, its conveniences and surroundings, show unmistakable signs of the progressive spirit. The final result of this uplifting wave on the financial, social, and educational future of this naturally favored section of the country will be watched by the outsider and the home leaders with more than a passing interest.

The chief lines for improvement are: (1) A systematic method of preserving the soil; (2) better plowing and preparation before planting; (3) use of better seeds; (4) more frequent and shallow cultivation; (5) special study of commercial fertilizers and the importance of home manures; (6) map out a crop rotation; (7) raise more and better stock; (8) study manner of preparing crops for market and where to sell to best advantage. These headings may be broken up into many others.

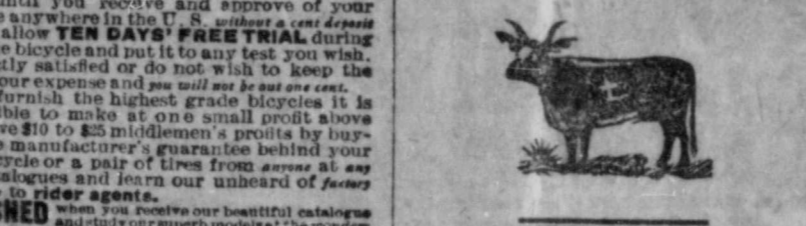

Add a pint and a half of milk, salt and pepper to taste. When hot pour over it the white of an egg that has been beaten until stiff. This egg may be used as a garnish on the top of the soup if desired.

SOUPS FOR COOL EVENINGS.

When the main meal is taken at noon there is no dish at night that goes to the spot? Like a nice hot dish of soup. Cream soups are appropriate for this meal and they are legion, so that all tastes may be gratified.

Cocoanut Soup.—This is one that is so perfectly delicious that the trouble of preparation will be swallowed with the first taste. Cook two pounds of veal bones in two quarts of water put over them cold. When reduced to one quart add the grated meat (or meat put through a meat chopper) of one cocoanut and cook a half hour; strain and add the milk of the nut and add a pint of cream. Reheat and thicken with a tablespoonful each of flour and butter cooked together. Season with salt, pepper and a little onion juice and, just as ready to serve, pour over two slightly beaten eggs.

Queen Victoria's Favorite Soup

Remove the fat from one quart of water in which a fowl has been cooked. Season with salt, pepper, onion juice and celery salt. Mash the yolks of three hard-cooked eggs, mix with half a cup of bread crumbs soaked in a little milk until soft. Chop the white meat of the chicken until fine as meal and stir it into the egg and bread paste. Add a pint of hot cream slowly, then add to the chicken liquor. Boil five minutes, add more salt and, if too thick, more cream; if too thin, add more crumbs. It should be a purée.

A fine soup may be made of the wing tips and bones of a turkey left from dinner.

The tough ends of steak, with a few bones, will make another good-flavored soup.

IDEAS THAT HELP.

The silver mesh bags, fan chains, lorgnette and watch chains may be cleaned by first soaking them in a little alcohol and then rubbing with dry camellia.

Never allow silver to stand over night without washing, after being used. Wash in soapuds and rub dry before putting away.

Here is a dainty little dessert that will delight the small people and the older ones will not refuse it:

Grape Tarts.—Remove the pulp from well-washed grapes and put the skins in another dish. Cook the pulp until the seed can be easily removed by straining through a colander. The skins need longer cooking to make them tender. Put all together and cook with a little sugar to sweeten. Fill tart shells with the mixture and serve cold with whipped cream.

Many like those filled with the uncooked grapes, removing the seeds.

When drawing threads for hemstitching rub the goods where the threads are to be drawn with a piece of soap. The thread will slip out much easier.

A dainty and delicious salad: Have muskmelons and fill with the fruit cut in small cubes, garnish with green grapes or cherries and serve with French dressing.
