"The prompt application of artificial respiration is of primary importance, and for this purpose the prone pressure method is easiest, simplest and most effective. This should begin at once and continue rhythmically until natural breathing is established-this may take four or more hours. Procedure:

First: Kneel and straddle the





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

In Illinois, three Trailor brothers confessed murdering a man named Fisher, and witnesses testified to having seen the dead body, yet Fisher turned up alive. In the same state a man named Turner was sentenced to death, but secured a new trial and before the second trial could be held the alleged victim returned.

These are only three out of a large number of similair cases cited by Mr. Cantwell, who declares that he has authentic records of no less than 129 persons who confessed and were executed for murders, although their sup-Your wants are few and easy posed victims were found to be alive afterwards.
