Low Down on "Hot Check Law"

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS

SECTION 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, with intent to defraud, to obtain money, goods, service, labor, or anything of value by giving or drawing any check, draft, or order upon any bank, person, firm or corpo-

Behind the Scenes In American Business

NEW YORK, July 17-BUSIness-After dropping along timlessly for months, the stock market last week gave financial observers reason for cheer. They were encouraged by the "growing volume as stocks broke out of their rut on the upside." This is a technical way of saying that the majority of investors (it is estimated there are 25,000,000 throughout the nation) view the immediate business prospects hopefully.

Disturbed by war scares and plodding domestic business, few person lately have been willing to hazard a guess, backed by money, as to the direction of trade and industry. Those who owned stocks couldn't make up their minds to sell, while those with cash couldn't decide to buy. As a result, tranactions in stocks have been drawn day-byday on a chart comparatively small, and prices showed little deviation from a straight line. WASHINGTON- Last week's adjournment hopes of Congress faded as the Senate Banking Committee began hearings on the Administration's new "lending-spendn " proposal. Federal Works Administrator John M. Carmody told the committee a \$350,000,-000 fund for non-Federal public works would give some 420,000,000 man hours of employment to workers on the projects and in forests, mines, mills, factories and transportation. Purchase of construction materials-iron steel, machinery, cement, stone, clay, glass and lumber-costing \$200,000,000 would aid heavy goods industry.







Ripe Peach Jeliy



"SOMETHING OLD, SOME. THING NEW" is as nice for the pantry as it is for the bride . . . and if you've never made ripe peach jelly, you'll like this recipe. Peach jelly is still cooking news, you know - grandmother wouldn't have believed it. The trick is to add the pectin to the fruit juice-it doesn't have any of its own.

. These directions are quite foolproof, give you nine glasses from just three cups of juice, and all the flavor of sun-ripened fruit. Best of all-the half-minute boil won't heat up the kitchen these warm days!

RIPE PEACH JELLY (Makes about 9 medium glasses)

3 cups juice 61/2 cups sugar 1 bottle fruit pectin

To prepare juice, remere pits from about 31/2 pounds fully ripe peaches. Do not peel. Crush peeher thoroughly. Add 1/2 cup water.

Bring to a boil, cover, and simmer 5 minutes. Place fruit in jelly cloth or bag and squeeze out juice.

Measure sugar and juice into large saucepan and mix. Bring to a boil over hottest fire and at once add bottled fruit pectin, stirring constantly. Then bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1/2 minute.

Remove from fire, skim, pour quickly. Paraffin hot jelly at once.

AUSTIN-The action of Gov O'Daniel in slashing \$5,000,000 in round numbers, from the appropriation bills was the center of interest in Austin this week end. The consensus of opinion here was that the governor's action would be approved by the people, and would make a good talking point in his re-election campaign next year. Observers here or at least those without personal bias, were of the opinion that the budget cuts were a wholesome thing. There is a tendency on the part of the State department heads to build up the personnel and the expense of their bureaus, and a pruning of deadwoods periodically is undoubtedly a good thing. The influence of the New Deal and its free spending policy has spread to Austin, and there has been a constant rise in activity and expenditure by State departments. O'Daniel's action, there fore, required political courage, because it undoubtedly antagonized a great many State employes who vote, but most observers here believed the Governor would benefit politically in the long run from his action. South Shocked By Talk That She is Problem Number One.

Charlottsville, Va., July 13-Dr. Will Alexander of the Farm Security administration, told the institute of public affairs today that along with other southerners he was shocked by the Nationa Emergency council's report to President Roosevelt branding the South America's No. 1 economic

"As a southerner, I am sure it was a good thing," Alexander said. "We need to be shocked-shocked into doing something. We of the South have almost permitted a whirlpool of destructive forces to overwhelm us, because we are too proud to shout for help . . . attempts to do something about the problem largely originated outside the South and often were resented by the native Southerners. Witness the TVA, which has meant so much to large areas of the South and yet was chiefly the work of a Nebraskan and a New Yorker."

Alexander said that he would like to call attention to the South as the nation's greatest untapped market to the nation's business men, financiers and planners.

"I say to you with conviction-give the South a chance to buy and America can forget many of her economic troubles," Alex-

This could be done by direct rural home subsidies and expansion of the Farm Security program o rehabilitating tenant farmers, would be steps in the solution, he

"The government could easily nany years to come in rehabilitaing the southern farmer," Alexander added. "Most of this investment would be directly selfliquidating. All of it would be in directly self-liquidating through the increased revenue pouring into the treasury from revived indus-
