Venereal Disease Control: There has been but one venereal disease case admitted for medical service and one field wisit. The nurses and Dr. Brumage have made lectures and shown films at schools clubs, and P.-T. A. meetings in order to educate the public regarding the facts about venereal diseases.

Maternity Service: This service includes all cases admitted to nursing service, antepartum and postpartum; visits to private phycicians, antepartum and postpartum; field nursing visits, antepartum and postpartum; and examinations made by physicians. There as been a total 283 individual dmitted to these services.

Infant and Pre-School Hygiene There has been a total of 260 individuals attended by nursing services, field nursing visits and of-

fice nursing visits. Social Hygiene: To date, 337 inspections have been made by the physicians and nurses, 45 individuals admitted to nursing service, 116 field nursing visits, 2361 inspections by dentists and 36 visits to schools, consultations with teachers and showing of puppet show Morbidity Service: There have been 7 additions to nursing service and 12 field nursing visits to morbidity cases.

Crippled Children Service: Seven children have been admitted to this service including nursing service, nursing visits, and visits to

diagnostic clinics. General Sanitation: There has been a total of 185 sanitary inspections made by Mr. Jeff Reese, Jr., Sanitarian for the unit. These inspections include those of private premises, camp sites, schools public water supplies, sewage plants, breeding places, food-handling establishments, and visits to dairy farms.

Reportable diseases: Diseases reported for the three months to this office by doctors in the five counties are as follows: Chickenpox 21, diphtheria 1, dysentery 1 influenza 106, malaria 1, measles 32, pellagra 2, pneumonia 17, scarlet fever 6, smallpox 4, tuberculosis 1, typhoid fever 1 and whooping cough 30.

This report is published in the hope that the people will see the value of their local health office and feel free to call on any of the personnel when their help or services are needed on any health or sanitation question or problem.

The first tools were crude chopping or digging implements of wood, stone, shell, or bone, depending on the material available. The area that could be tilled was sharply limited. The second stage of tillage came with the application of the power of domesticated animals to the task. It was now posible to substitute a steady forward movement of the tillage implements for the succesive chopping or spading motions of the hand implements.
