From Asperment to **Forth Worth**

Twelve towns along highway 380, which has both State and U. S. designation is being put forth to extend it from Aspermont into Fort Worth via Rule, Haskell, Throckmorton, Newcastle, Graham, Bryson and Jacksboro.At present the route drops southeast into Stamford to Albany, which is way out of the way, and takes the crooked roads through Stephens and Palo Pinto counties.

The new route would be far nearer, and avoid the crooked roads. The main reason for the change would be taking a lot of traffic of U. S. 300, and direct them from Fort Worth and Dallas over a much nearer route, if the tourist was headed for any place in this section, or even on to the formed us this week that he had late information of the route west of Roswell and that it would be completely paved in the next two or three months.

There is a small section now being completed between Aspermont and Rule, and the section between Plains and Bronco that the State Highway Department is still working on. With these exceptions, the highway is paved from Fort Worth through here on to the Pacific coast.
