### For Farm Kitchens



For the first time since the introduction of electric refrigeration, the farm kitchen now can have an electric refrigerator with equipment definitely designed to solve the problem of space for both normal food storage and safekeeping of large quantities of eggs, cream, meat and other farm items. Made by Frigidaire, this refrigerator is said to have all basic features of regular models and in addition is fitted with a set of special shelves which may be adjusted in a multitude of different combinations. One shelf combination shown above illustrates how provision is made for storing bulky items plus a wide assortment of foods for family needs. The basket shown holds 15 dozen eggs, while the cream can has a five gallon capacity. **Cleanup Week Set**  
Monday, May 20 has been designated by Mayor Coleman as the beginning of Cleanup Week and he is requesting that every civic organization and every citizen of the city join him in making a success of it. We had a cleanup week last year which did not come up to our expectations for the very simple reason that the civic organizations fell down on the job and people in general were very indifferent. Now, if the Maids and Matrons, Women's Business club, Lions, Rotarians, Junior Chamber of Commerce and Chamber of Commerce will get in there and "pitch" instead of promising and not performing we can have a clean town at the end of the week and can keep it clean with very little trouble if all of us will cooperate and burn our trash instead of throwing it out the door and letting the wind whip it wherever it may.

**Soil Conservation District**  
In another part of this newspaper there is an article that deals with a proposed Tri-County Soil Conservation District composed of Yoakum, Cochran and Terry counties and all owners of farm or pasture land in any one of the three are eligible to vote upon it. A land owner may reside in Terry County and own land in either Cochran or Yoakum and will be allowed to vote at his usual voting box. A poll tax receipt is necessary and a man and his wife are each allowed a vote. A two-third vote is necessary for the creation of the district, but following the program is entirely voluntary and not at all compulsory, but if the district is created the services of several federal and state agencies will be available to us in the solution of our soil conservation problems. The election upon the proposal is to be held Saturday, May 2. Read the article mentioned and you will find the voting box named for your use.

**About Marking Streets**  
A proposal for marking the streets and constructing sidewalks was put up to the directors of the chamber of commerce several months ago, but at the time we were informed by Mayor Coleman, who is a member of the board, that as soon as the present paving program was completed that it was the intention of the city to place durable markers on all streets and also to undertake to secure a W. P. A. appropriation for sidewalk construction. This being the case the directors did not feel that any further action was necessary.
