Too Much Concentra- The Herald Family **Panhandle** Populat'n tion of Industry, Says Less Than So. Plains

LUBBOCK, June 26 .- For the first time population of the South Plains, as shown by the 19th Congressional district, has exceeded that of the North Panhandle or the 18th district, preliminary census figures for 1940 indicate.

Complete but preliminary reports from 23 out of 25 counties comprising the 19th district show 264,474 as of April 1 this year, compared to 250,207 ten years ago. Ten of the counties showed an in-, crease and 18 a decrease. The two not yet reported, Gaines and Yoakum, both will show increases. Gain was 14,267.

Loss of 16,683

For the 18th district, 27 out of 28 counties show 236,711 inhabitants, a loss of 16,683, there being 253,904 residents ten years ago. Moore county, not reported, will show a gain it is expected.

Potter county leads both the 18th district and the territory with 55,-896 inhabiants. This is a gain in ten years of 9,816. 


PATROLLED HIGHWAYS

of Texas, shows that adequate highway patrols are essential to the reduction of highway accidents. Concentration of that state's patrol force of 150 in a single district for two months this year resulted in a marked improvement in safety. Accidents were reduced 40 per cent under the previous two months, and fatalities 60 per cent. As a result, efforts are now being made to enlarge the personnel of Virginia's highway pa-

Texas has suffered a serious increase in traffic accidents and fatalities since the Legislature, in the interest of economy, curtailed this state's highway patrol. The broad expanses of the Texas highway system and the heavy traffic on arterial roads make it imperative that the patrol force be enlarged if accidents are to be reduced again. On the Dallas-Fort Worth pike, the patrol has shown that its efforts are highly effective; similar results can be obtained over the whole highway system if enough men are provided.

The mere knowledge that the highway on which he is driving thers always welcome. is being patrolled tends to restrain the average motorist from reckless habits. For those on whom this restraint is not effective, arrests have to be made. This task requires that the Department of Public Safety be given enough men to patrol every mojor highway in the state. Members of the Legislature can hardly deny that the lives of Texas motorists are worth the cost of this protection. -Dallas News







Good Year For **Trench Silo**

The Southwest has been blessed with abundant grass thus far this year. Indications point to good feed crops. The only way much of this feed can be saved is to store it in silos. Although Texas has approximately 30,000 trench silos with a capacity of 3,500,000 tons of silage, it will take twice that number to save the feed crops now being produced. Trench silos are being constructed in adjoining states. Oklahoma and Arkansas are getting in line and a few are being constructed in Louisiana. Trench silos are also found efficient for feed storage in New Mexico.

Attention of farmers unfamiliar with the feeding of silage is called to the fact that it is not a complete ration, but a supplement. For best results, grain, cottonseed

SODIUM FLORIDE'LL GET COCKROACHES

College Station, July 1.-Sodium flouride, either pure or mixed with equal parts of flour, is the ticket for killing cockroaches.

Roaches will tackle almost any kind of food and usually pollute several times more than they actually eat. The pests hang out in the kitchen or pantry or other places where food is kept.

For control, dust sodium flouride in the places frequented by the roaches, especially along the edges of the rooms. The best results will be obtained by use of a dust gun which will force the

dust into cracks and crevices. The insecticide is most effective when applied in the evening, since roaches do not move around much in the day time.

"Sodium floride is toxic to man and animals and should not be used where children may get at it," warns Cameron Siddall, entomologist of the Texas A. and M. Extension Service.

"It can be swept out each morning, but I recommend ground pyrethrum in homes where there are small children." Pyrethrum is not poisonous to humans.

The entomologist says commercial sprays are not effective unless the insects are actually hit by the spray.
