Tank Water Put

To Many Uses

Many farmers who have large ponds have been stocking them with fish. The pond should have water in it at least a year prior to stocking unless fertilized. Only hatchery size, two to three inches

long, fish should be put in the pond. Bass may be put in about one or two months prior to stock-

ing with other species, but bass should not be used in ponds having less than two surface acres of water.

> About 50 bass or croppie or mudcats per acre foot at the low water level is recommended as a suitable rate of stocking. If bluegills are used about 400 fish per or and 125,000 tenant farmers foot acre is recommended. who supported him two years ago.

It is often advisable to stock minnows in lakes having bass Ponds properly stocked usually will not need restocking, for a single pair of fish per acre can provide ample supplies. However, if restocking is necessary, all fish should be removed and the proper number of small fish put in.

NEW TAXES GO INTO EFFECT

The \$4,692,500,000 national defense bill recently enacted by the government of the United States will draw heavily on income tax payers and will effect persons with all types of salary incomes due to the fact that it places small levies on various commodities.

The tax boost became effective July 1 on all commodities such as liquor and cigarets and will last 5 years. The income tax changes are retroactive to 1940 income and will be payable March 15, 1941. Minor increases also were made in inheritance and gift taxes, effective on deaths or gifts occurring after the President's signature.
