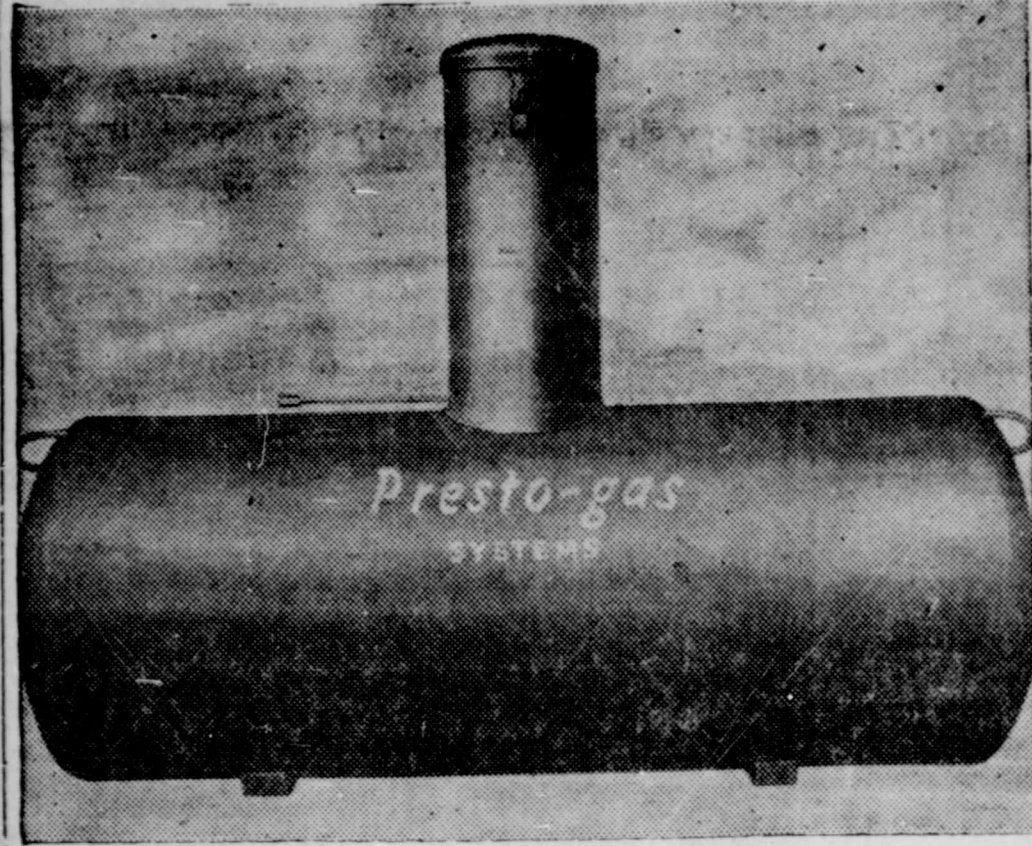

STATE SANATORIUM HAS TREATED 28,000 TEXANS

SANATORIUM, July 15.—Independence Day, July 4, marked the twenty-eighth anniversary of the formal opening of the State Tuberculosis Sanatorium, one of the largest state sanatoria in the United States for the treatment of lung disease. The sanatorium is located seventeen miles northwest of San Angelo. Treatment is free to residents of Texas who are unable to pay.

Since its establishment in 1912, the institution has treated approximately 28,000 residents of Texas, or an average of 1,000 patients annually.

When established, the sanatorium was a small colony of half a dozen buildings, including three dormitories with fifty-seven beds

for patients. Today the sanatorium has forty major buildings including seventeen dormitories with approximately 1,000 beds. The original colony was erected with a State appropriation of less than \$100,000, but the present sanatorium represents an investment of more than \$2,000,000 to the State.

The enlargement of the sanatorium through the years has been planned and supervised by Dr. J. B. McKnight who became superintendent two years after the hospital opened and has served continuously since. Dr. McKnight is assisted by eleven resident physicians at the hospital and a number of subordinate departmental heads.

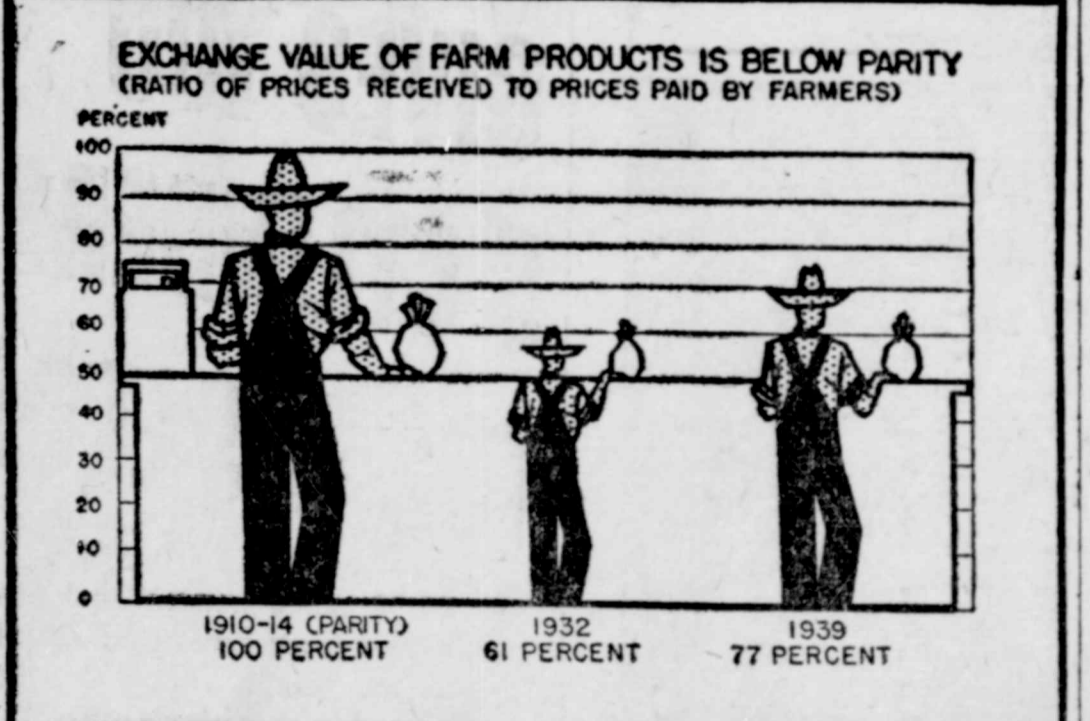

NEW TAXES GO INTO EFFECT

The \$4,692,500,000 national defense bill recently enacted by the government of the United States will draw heavily on income tax payers and will effect persons with all types of salary incomes due to the fact that it places small levies on various commodities. The tax boost became effective July 1 on all commodities such as liquor and cigarets and will last 5 years. The income tax changes are retroactive to 1940 income and will be payable March 15, 1941. Minor increases also were made in inheritance and gift taxes, effective on deaths or gifts occurring after the President's signature.

No Need To Have Typhoid Fever

AUSTIN, July 8.—The control of typhoid fever in the United States represents an outstanding achievement in preventive medicine. In 1900, the national death rate from this disease was 31.3 per hundred thousand; today, the rate is 1.9. This marked decrease in typhoid deaths is based on knowledge of its cause, how it is spread, and the application of control measures. Perhaps at this time, no other disease is more vulnerable to scientific attack than typhoid fever. "Indeed, it is no exaggeration to say that from a public health point of view, there should be no typhoid fever," declares Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

However, Dr. Cox pointed out that typhoid, while an unnecessary evil, was a persistent attacker of Texans. Each year about four hundred Texans die of typhoid, and approximately four thousand are ill. The average duration of illness is about six weeks, which makes typhoid responsible for the loss of 168,000 man days in Texas each year.

Typhoid prevention is a simple procedure. Typhoid vaccine is injected under the skin in the upper part of the arm, in three doses, usually at weekly intervals. It ordinarily protects against the disease from two to three years or longer, although one who is definitely exposed to infection should be re-vaccinated at more frequent intervals.

Typhoid fever can be controlled

by the use of pure water, pasteurized milk or clean milk, clean foods, proper disposal of sewage, screening against flies and destroying their breeding places, by search for and care of human typhoid carriers, and by the general practice of vaccination.

Certain people, apparently healthy carry the germs of typhoid in their intestines or urinary tracts and cause many cases of typhoid each year by insanitary personal habits. They are called typhoid carriers, and many cases of typhoid result from personal contact with these carriers.

In selecting a place for a vacation, choose one where the water and milk supplies are pure. Be sure that the food supply is screened against flies. When camping, it is best to boil water used for drinking, unless purity has been certified. Clear, sparkling stream water may be polluted.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has developed a cotton hose, known as style No. 106, that is as sheer and silky as other hose. The National Cotton Council thinks it may eventually use up as much as 100,000 bales of cotton a year.

Terry Raises More Cotton Than It Gins

It used to be the harp for the harpist to harp on in his Harp-on News over at Plains that Terry ginned all their cotton, and got credit for it. But that wasn't literally the truth, as some Yoakum cotton is ginned at Seagraves in Gaines county. Even with that year before last as well as last year Terry county raised more cotton than was ginned inside its area—more by 657 bales last year.

And, perhaps, unless Yoakum county increases their acreage and do not put in a gin, we will show a greater loss this year, as Lynn county is putting in another gin close to the line of the two counties at West Point. Lynn county ginned nearly 5,000 more bales than it raised last year.

Nine counties of the area grew more than they ginned: Bailey, Briscoe, Cochran, Dawson, Floyd, Garza, Lubbock, Motley and Terry. Reports for the state were: 2,736,764 bales ginned and 2,724,471 bales grown.

The pellagra death rate—aided by a diet in which vegetables have little part—is said to be appalling among natives on the southern tip of South Africa. Among infants, 400 out of every 1,000 die, and a baby has less than an even chance to live to be 15 years old. There were 644 deaths from pellagra in Texas in 1938.

Doc Stork Busy In Texas in 1939

Old Doc Stork had a busy time in Texas during 1939. Every fourth minute he added a new Texan to the family circle.

Fourteen births were recorded per hour, 336 per day, 10,086 per month, and the 1939 total was 121,033.

This gives Texas a birth rate of 19.6 per thousand population, 2.2 above the national average of 17.4, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, announced.

Texas, fifth in total national population, placed third in total number of births registered. It was exceeded only by New York, with a population twice that of Texas, whose births exceeded Texas' by only 65,826; and Pennsylvania, with 50 per cent more total population, recorded only 40,000 more total births than Texas.

A total of 22,236 ranches have adopted the AAA Soil Conservation program in Texas, and all are pleased, and believe it will mean more grass and better soil.

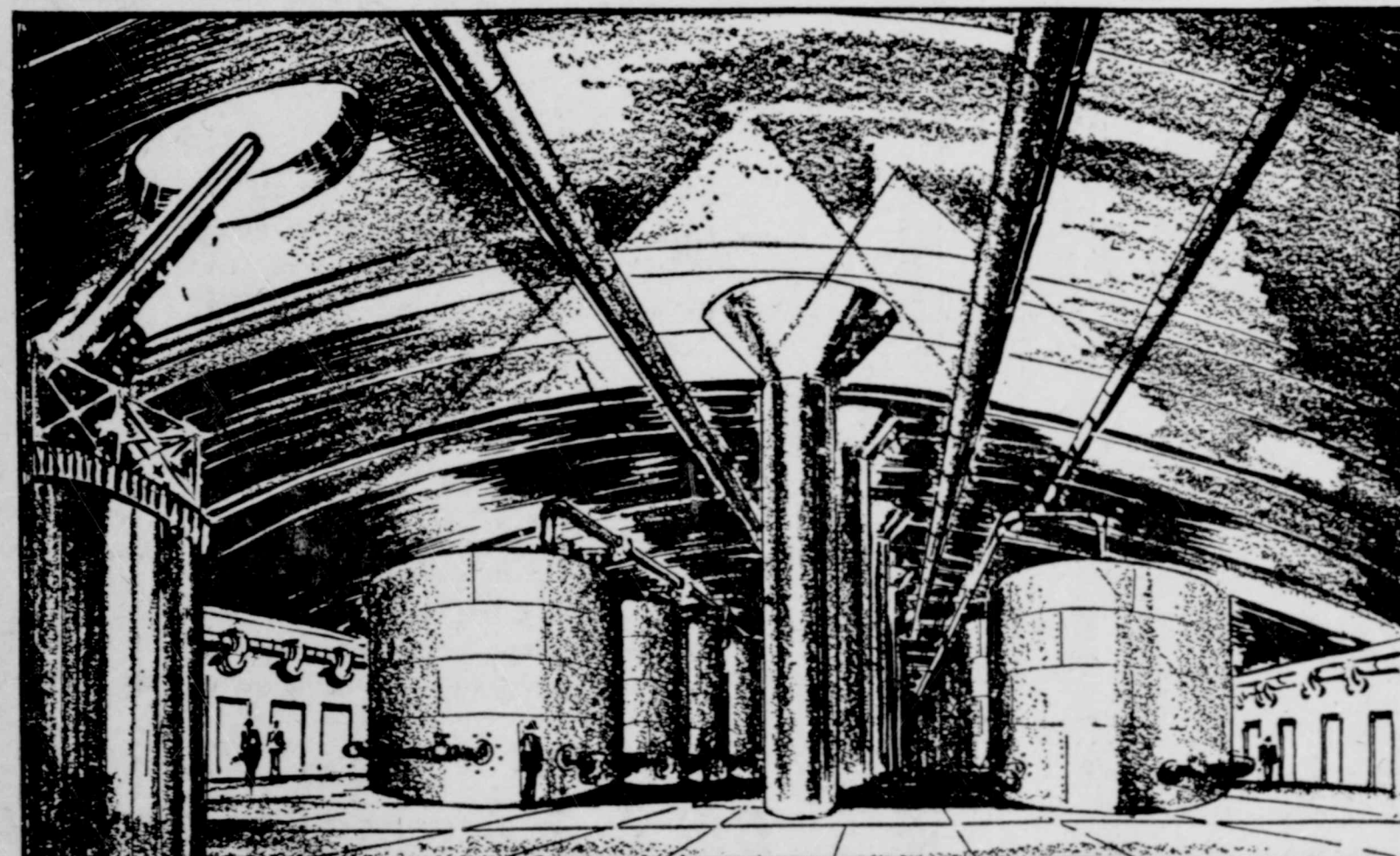

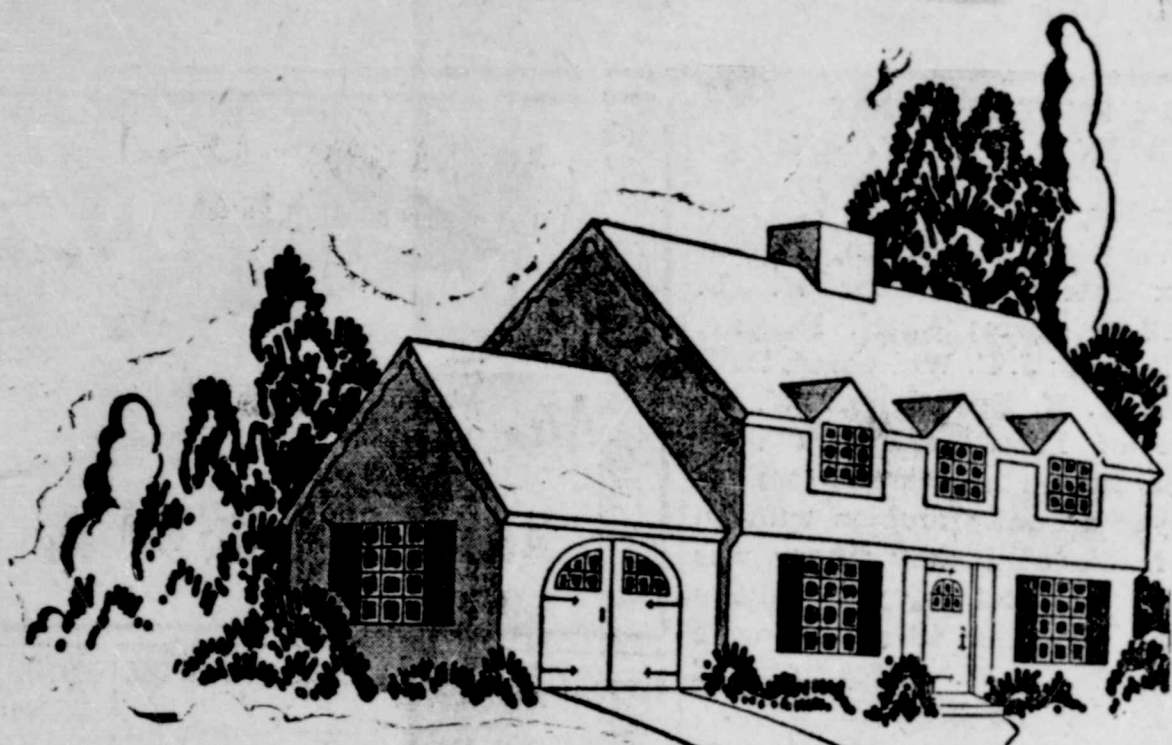

Formal Statement Of Marshall Formby

Charging that the members of the last Legislature had bitterly disappointed the people in failing to solve the old age assistance and other social security problems and in failing to raise the truck load limit law, Judge Marshall Formby of Dickens county, a candidate for the State Senate



of the 30th District issued a formal statement concerning his senatorial candidacy. Judge Formby, serving his fourth year as county judge of Dickens county, made the following statement:

"Because the people have been promised so much and given so little during the past two years, I hesitate to infringe upon their good nature with a load of promises in order to influence them to vote for me for state senator. However, there are a number of vital questions the people want answered and I submit the following as my formal plea to the voters of the 30th senatorial district:

Cooperation Pledged

"The state government should be placed on a cash basis like any sensible business is run. This can be done through economy in the ination of overlapping governmental agencies. It is foolish business for the state to continue to build up a deficit in the general fund. Business-like methods, the same as we have inaugurated in Dickens county's government, should be adopted.

"The laborer should be given at all times a fair deal and I favor at all times a fair deal and I favor legislation for his protection.

"I favor legislation favorable to agricultural interests believing that only when agriculture prospers in West Texas does the average business man prosper. For the benefit of agricultural interests, I favor or revision of the present truck load limit. The truck load limit should be raised to a sensible limit.

"It is unfair for certain counties in Texas to have remitted back to them the state ad valorem tax and I will oppose this special legislation to certain favored counties in Texas.

"Because as a county judge, I have learned the various problems relative to the care of unfortunates in Texas, I shall fight always for humane treatment and care of the insane, feeble-minded, epileptic, deaf and dumb and the blind.

"In order that the average citizen might have his day in court and have his problems solved without having to waste his time and money, I shall favor legislation to speed up civil procedure in the Texas courts.

"It shall be my aim at all times to support legislation favorable to the average farmer, laborer and business man.

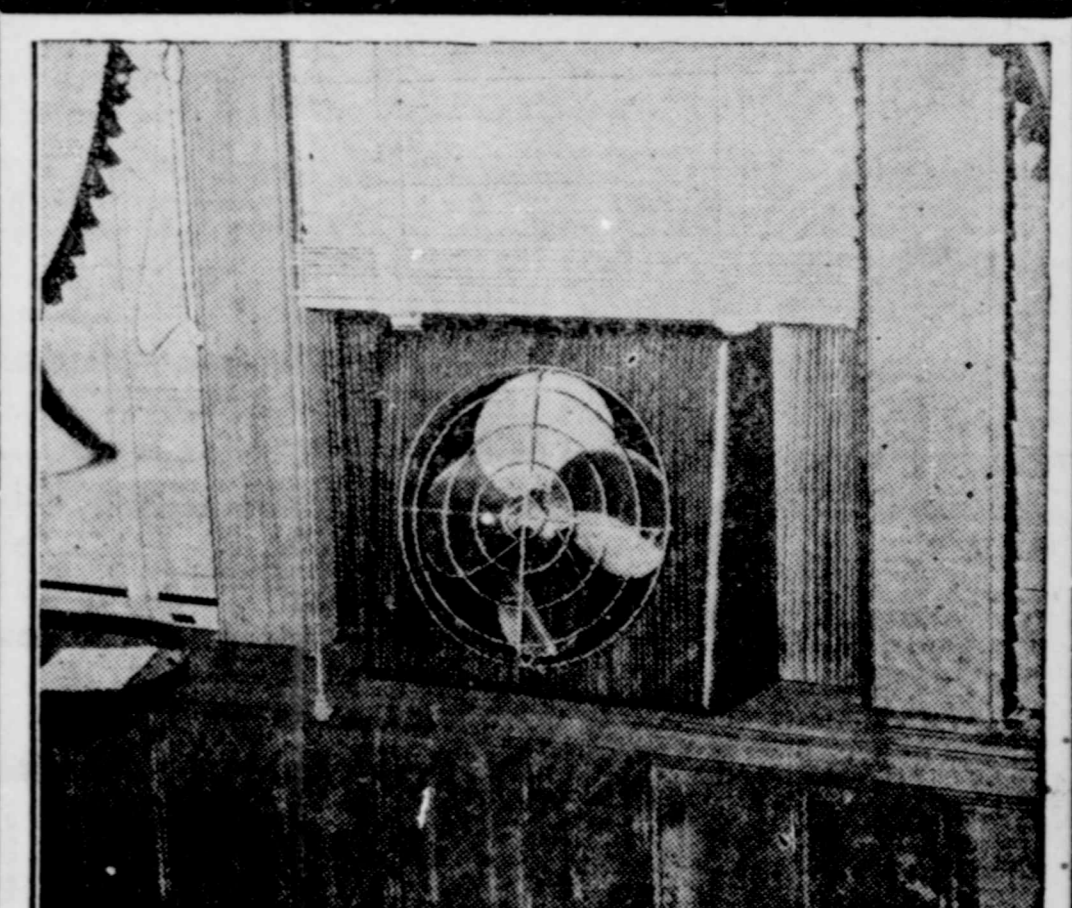
