Many farmers have made contour cultivation of their crops easier by placing their field boundaries on the contour. Because of the rapid spread of terracing and contour cultivation as soil and water conservation practices, contour fences and field boundaries also have become quite popular within recent years.

The placing of field boundaries along terraces or other contour lines eliminates many point rows where contour cultivation of strip cropping is carried out as a regular farm practice. It is also found that these contour field boundaries often follow changes in the type of the land.






