Best indications are, according to cotton men and ginners, that the area by this time is between 65 and 75 per cent harvested. The past two weeks has seen the peak of ginning passed in many sections. Staple length and quality have been good this year. Rains have stained the cotton somewhat, lowering grades, but on the whole, otton men report, the greater proportion is still going into the government loan. Buyers report a slight increase in the offering of lower grade cotton to the trade, but the volume is still high.

Approximately 90 per cent of he cotton ginned so far has gone into the loan.







For years we have done bus-To hundreds, perhaps, of our readers, who have been to San Antonio, perhaps spent weeks and months there, this short sketch will not be interesting, so skip it. Yet, perhaps there are some like ourself that had merely passed through without any sightseeing. Will state that it was either fogging or raining the livelong time we were there, so we saw much less than we wished to see. According to his statement and supporting figures dairymen are breeding themselves out of the dairy business through the practice of crossing their top dairy cows with beef bulls for the purpose of obtaining a beef type calf slightly more salable on the market than the straight Jersey steer calf. In so doing, they are totally disregarding the future of the dairy industry and the dairy cow for a temporary gain.







WORLD IN FLAMES, on account of the nature of the events depicted, is no happy story. War, refugees, death and destruction are in almost every foot of the hour-long film. Beginning at the time of the 1929 crash the picture shows outstanding newsreel records right up to the "Battle of Britain." The first years are covered swiftly and most emphasis s given to World War II.

Many of the scenes will be remembered but the subjects are of such importance that they are worth seeing over and over again. The editing and unifying commentary have made the film impres-

The story told by the actual newsreel shots made as the events were happening is mainly one of aggresion. It begins with the Japanese advance in Manchuria, marked by the protest of the United States. The next important happening is the Italian adventure n Ethiopia. Trouble in Spain is an undercurrent. Foreign intervention on behalf of both sides in that struggle is indicated: Help to Franco from Italy and Germany and aid to the other party from Stalin. Also shown is the undeclared war in China where the death and misery is sometimes forgotten since our attention turned to Europe after Sept. 1, 1939.

In the years 1930 and part of 1940 the War in Europe is given the principle attention. Notable among these scenes, fresh in the memory of theatre goers, are those of Arthur Menken in Norway, the retreat from Dunkirk and shots nade by the Germans in Poland and used in their war of terror propaganda films.

CARL ANTON JACOBSON

Carl Anton Jacobson, father of Dr. M. E. Jacobson, died at his son's home in Brownfield on Nov. 19, 1940. He was born on Dec. 7, 1874 at Dallas, Illinois. At the age of about five he moved with his father and family to Albion, Neb., where they founded their homestead. He lived in this community for the most part until May 1915 and while living at Albion he met and was married to Ellen Nygren on March 21, 1901. To this union on April 3, 1902 was born one son, Dr. M. E. Jacobson.

In 1915 the deceased moved with his family to Omaha, Neb., where he resided until 1932, at which time he moved to Terry county, and during his residence in Terry county he lived in the Meadow and Brownfield communities. Following this he moved to Arcadia, California in September of 1939, which place was his residence at the time of his death On Nov. 3, 1940 he returned to Brownfield on a visit to his son's family and six days following his return he developed a severe heart attack from which he never recovered, his death occurring on

The scope of the program is limited to groups financially unable to purchase mattresses from commercial concerns and will interfere in no way with the sale of mattresses through commercial channels.

Families are eligible if they live in the country and had a total income of not more than \$500 for the previous calendar year. For each member of the family in excess of four, this figure may be raised \$50.00.

If they live in a village, town, or city and receive at least half of their total income during the previous calendar year from agricultural occupations, providing, of course, the total income was not more than \$500.

Each eligible family may receive one mattress for each two persons in the family, not to exceed a total of three mattresses.

As in the 1940 program, eligibility of rural families will be determined by county agricultural conservation committees.



Secretary of State To Appoint Notaries

County Clerk H. M. Pyeatt supplied the Herald with the followng information:

"Due to the passage of the constitutional Amendment authorizing appointment of Notaries Public by the Secretary of State, appointments will be made from and after the canvass of the vote on Nov. 20, 1940. Appointment made before June 1, 1941, will expire on that date. All appointments made on June 1, 1941, or thereafter, will expire on June 1, 1943. There has been no change in the existing law other than requiring the applicant to be 21 years of age and a resident of the County, and further that under the old law the Governor appointed all Notaries with the advice and consent of the Sen-
