Record Vote Of 49,808,624 Nov. 5

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16—The American electorate cast a new record vote of 49,808,624 last Nov. 5 and chose Franklin D. Roosevelt as the Nation's first third term President by a plurality of 4,914,713.

Final returns as compiled by the Associated Press—official in 46 States and unofficial in Nebraska and Rhode Island—show the popular vote to have been divided this way:

Terry County Stands Sixth In Ginnings

(From Lubbock Evening Journal)
Hockley county continued to lead the South Plains in cotton production for the 1940 crop, as the Dec. 1 ginnings by the bureau of the census, department of commerce, showed it to rank 10th in the state, with Lamb 15th and Lubbock 17th.

Total ginnings for the area was 350,906, compared with 245,839 for the corresponding date a year ago, still showing a slight gain over the previous year.

90 Per Cent Said Ginned
With indications of approximately 90 per cent of the crop in the area ginned, the ginnings for the season will probably fall below the 400,000 bale mark.

Lynn county ranks fourth in the area; Dawson fifth; Terry sixth and Bailey seventh; all with more than 20,000 bales ginned.

Seven counties showed smaller ginnings this year than last; Castro, Crosby, Garza, Hale, Lubbock, Lynn and Parmer.

Date For Construction On Highway 51 Set

According to information from the office of Joe E. Ward, Consulting Engineer in charge of County Road Construction, plans for the construction of a flexible base and asphalt surface on Highway No. 51 from Brownfield to the Hockley County Line are near completion, and it is expected that a contract will be let for construction on this project about the Ninth of January.

For the past several weeks a crew of men have been employed by the county for making survey for location of caliche on or near this proposed road. Some three thousand stakes used by the Engineers for surveying purposes are being built by the N. Y. A. Program at our local school work shop. Definite details of progress will be given from time to time. It is the desire of the Commissioner's Court to rush this program as our oil activities are developing daily.

Chambliss And Wife Visit Baylor U.

WACO, Dec. 16—Erika Kapralik, on the Baylor University campus with her husband, Woodrow Chambliss, an ex-student, to play leads in a Baylor theatre production, told today of being kicked about Europe by the Nazis and finally fleeing to America with the Chekhov theatre to escape the European war.

Both Miss Kapralik, Austrian-born and German schooled, and Chambliss, native of Brownfield, are members of the famed Chekhov experimental theatre.

Miss Kapralik left high paying jobs as actress in the state theatres at Nuremberg and Hamburg because the Nazi program robbed her and the theatre of the liberty she loved.

She was playing in Linz and saw Hitler parade down the city's street in his first expedition of conquest two and a half years ago. In Vienna she again felt the Nazi pinch and fled to England, where she joined the Chekhov group.

The group moved to America at the beginning of the present war.

Two Men Killed; One Seriously Injured

One of the worst highway tragedies that has happened here this year, occurred about 14 miles north of the city last Fri. night, in which Sterling Elmore, about 30 was killed instantly, and Tom McNeil died about an hour later. Harold McNeil was so badly injured that he is still in the Treadaway-Daniel hospital with internal injuries. The McNeil boys and Elmore were cousins.

Their light truck had a collision in the icy conditions that existed at that time, with a large truck belonging to an oil field construction company of Sundown. The driver of the large truck was uninjured. Funeral services were conducted for Tom McNeil Sunday and his body laid to rest in the Forrester cemetery. The body of Elmore was carried to Childress for burial.

At this time, we have not learned where blame for the accident was placed, if there was any blame, by Sheriff Ches Gore and two highway patrolmen. We understand the mother of the McNeil boys was in South Bend visiting, when the sad accident occurred, that carried one son to the grave, and the other to the hospital.

Big Irish of South Terry Visits Herald

But with usual Irishman honesty, he came forward, paid a dollar on arrears, another a year in advance, and went home happy.

Give Cotton Goods For Christmas

WACO, Dec. 9—"Give Cotton Gifts" is the slogan adopted by the State-wide Cotton Committee of Texas for the 1940 Christmas Season, and an urgent appeal is made to the people of Texas to join in the movement which is sweeping over the nation under the auspices of the National Cotton Council of America.

Governor O'Daniel has issued a proclamation declaring the month of December as "Cotton Christmas Gift Month" in Texas, in which he says that the giving of Christmas gifts made from cotton will prove to be a boomerang, reflecting joy and happiness not only to the recipients but to the givers.

Mayor L. T. Murray of Waco, chairman of mayor's committee for the state, has urged the head of every city government, big and little, to issue a proclamation of his own to arouse the interest of the people in this important matter in each community.

The Texas Retail Dry Goods Association, the Retail Merchants Association of Texas and dozens of State Associations strongly joined in the Cotton Christmas campaign.

Burris C. Jackson of Hillsboro, a Director of the National Cotton Council, and chairman of the general Texas committee in charge, stressed that many beautiful and useful products are made from cotton such as towels, curtains, draperies, handkerchiefs, neckties, fine dresses, table cloths, napkins, auto seat covers, mattresses, sheets, and hundreds of other articles.

"Now is the time for the people of Texas to really come to the aid of its greatest industry, and it is to be hoped that the people will give a universal response to this call," Mayor Murray said in urging widespread cooperation with the Cotton Christmas movement.

New Oil Wells Not Much Encouraging

Up to this writing, (Tuesday) neither of the Three Terry county wildcat oil wells give any indication that they will be producers, in so far as the general public is concerned. Of course the logging has been kept pretty well in the hands of the drillers and geologists.

Really the No. 1 Ima Lewis is not quite deep enough to judge much yet. The last report, according to Tuesday dailies, reads as follows:

Denver Producing No. 1 Ima Lewis, Terry County wildcat seven miles northeast of Seagraves and in section 62-DD Gibson, had drilled past 5,055 feet in lime. It was reported running low structurally, no markers had been released.

Completing its contract at 5,400 feet, Sloan & Zook No. 1 W. E. Bailey, Terry wildcat four miles northeast of Wellman and in section 103-4X-C&M, had reached 5,520 feet in lime with no shows. Gulf No. 4 Mallett, west of the south extension of the Slaughter pool, had cored to 5,776 feet with no shows of consequence.

December 26, Last Day For Aliens To Register

December 26th is the last day in which aliens can register, and all 14 years of age and over must be finger-printed. After that time Federal Judges must determine whether or not the alien purposely avoided the registration.

If they wilfully do so, there is a heavy penitentiary penalty as well as money fine. There is no need to "hire" anyone to help you, as that is the duty of your local postmaster, and the service is free to aliens.

If you happen to know of a friend who is not a citizen of the United States, and you have reason to believe that he is ignorantly avoiding registration, put him wise at once as it might save them several years in the pen, and a heavy fine.

Terry County WPA Sewing Project

From October 28, 1939 to November 2, 1940 the Terry County WPA Sewing Project has employed an average of thirty persons per month. Eleven persons are now employed. 5352 garments have been made using 9719 yards of material. The average number of yards per garment was 1.8 yards. 9056 1-4 yards of WPA material were used. The cost of material to WPA at 11c per yard was \$996.19. During this period the county furnished 662 3-4 yards of material costing \$83.25. The county also expended \$80.25 for utilities and \$602 for rental. Total WPA cost for labor amounts to \$6062.16.

About a year ago, we had the pleasure of viewing his collection, and found it was two hours well spent, although one could spend a day just as profitably. Mr. Slaughter enters private business, and has no room or time for his relics.

Roosevelt and Wallace were elected again this week by the electoral college. This will be the first time on record when a president has graduated from that college the third time, in the case of President Roosevelt. This old college joke is becoming so stale and so unnecessary, that it is believed the electoral idea will be discontinued before another presidential election, and the popular vote will end the matter.

Texas National Guardsmen had a big laugh recently when it was announced from headquarters in Washington that wood stoves were to be installed at Camp Bowie, Brownwood, as they feared the Texans would not know how to light gas stoves. 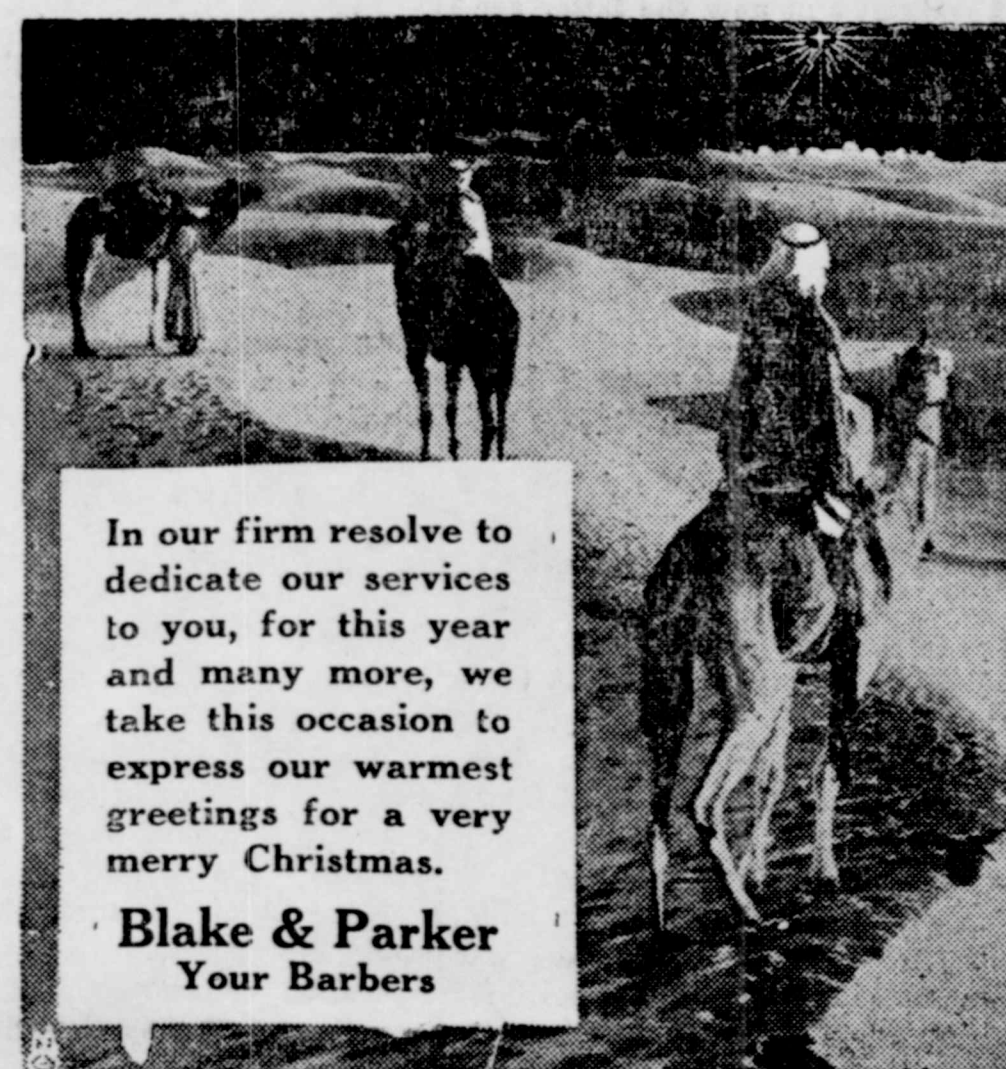

WATCH YOUR HEALTH THROUGH CHRISTMAS
AUSTIN, Dec. 16—"The Christmas season of all seasons is traditionally a time when happiness and good will should prevail on the earth. America more than any other nation has cause to celebrate Christmas in its proper spirit, and illness has no place in this celebration," states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Unfortunately, during the holiday season many of us relax our principles of good health which normally we observe. The stimuli of Christmas shopping, holiday parties, family reunions, and a too rich dietary cause us to transgress against the rules of simple living. The result is unnecessary illness at a time when we can least afford it.

The chances for contracting influenza are greater during the holiday season this year if we do not watch our health. Influenza epidemics are widespread in California and are sweeping through the West, and if not guarded against, may strike a large section of the Texas population.

Dr. Cox states that there is no essential difference between the health principles to be observed during the holidays and those we maintain throughout the winter. A few simple rules, if observed, will enable Texas to enjoy the spirit of Christmas without ill effects.

1. Do not over-indulge in foods or seasonal cheer.
2. Do not hibernate in overheated and ill-ventilated rooms.
3. Try to maintain your regular sleep quota.
4. Get some exercise in the open air during the Christmas season to counteract the detrimental influences attendant upon holiday festivities.
5. Shop early. Avoid the last-minute hurried Christmas crowds. Keep the children out of stores during the Christmas rush.
6. Watch out for accident. Do not use open candles on Christmas trees or in decorations. Use asbestos wool to replace cotton for decorations. Keep foliage and paper wreaths from direct contact with electric bulbs. See that Christmas lights are properly wired to prevent short-circuiting.
7. Choose safe as well as appropriate toys for children. Take into consideration the place available for their use as well as the age of the child to minimize the accident factor.

DEER TRAPPING SEASON HUGE SUCCESS

AUSTIN, Dec. 9—Deer-trapping operations, which, before they are completed, may result in 500 to 1,000 bucks and does being trapped and transplanted on shot-out areas got under way auspiciously recently, according to reports received from field workers by the executive secretary of the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission here, he announced today.

The Game Department, using a new-style trap, one which catches a deer at a time, and one in which deer cannot injure themselves, hopes to double or quadruple its former distribution of deer as a result of the success of the new traps. Fifteen of 122 traps built for the Department were set on a South Texas area and the first morning it was found that fourteen of the fifteen traps contained deer. The following morning each trap contained a deer, making a total of 29 in two days. When all traps are put into operation in South or Southwest Texas or in the Hill Country it is expected that they will work just as efficiently.

Traps are baited and set each night. When the deer enters to feed, a door slams behind him

and he is trapped in an enclosure so narrow that he cannot injure himself. Field workers remove the deer each morning, place them on trucks and transport them to areas the Game Department is planting with game, areas upon which there is suitable food for deer, but from which the game had been shot off.

Deer are trapped in areas where they have become too numerous and there is not sufficient food.

The deer trapping project of the Texas Game Department is one of many by which the Commission hopes to eventually restock millions of acres of land in the Lone Star State with deer, turkey, quail, javelinas, beaver and antelope. Antelope trapping is already under way for the second consecutive year. Other trapping projects will be started soon.

TEXAS NEEDS MORE MANUFACTURING MILK

COLLEGE STATION, Dec. 16—Texas needs more manufacturing milk to meet the demands of its domestic market.

W. V. Maddox, Extension Service dairy manufacturing specialist for Texas A. and M. College says Texas imports butter, concentrated milks and cheese because the volume of manufacturing milk falls far short of demand.

"With increased population," he explains, "we need to produce still more dairy products. But, with some of the general practices and trend prevailing on most farms we may expect a decline in production of manufacturing milks".

Maddox believes that with the new era of agricultural policies and a change to larger farm units operated by hired labor, we may expect a decrease in producers of cream and milk for manufacturing purposes. The new methods have brought about a decrease in farm people who formerly produced milk and cream for their own tables and sold a little surplus to manufacturing plants. Their alternated status removed them from the producing class and placed them wholly within the consumer element.

Do You Know Texas?

Q. Can you tell me if any of L. Henry's stories were based upon his experiences while he was a draftsman in the General Land Office? D. W.

A. Two of O. Henry's most popular stories, "Bexar Scrip 2692," and "Witches Loaves," have their setting in the old land office building. Another, "Buried Treasure," resulted from a treasure in Pease Park, Austin, that O. Henry and several friends made while he was still employed in the land office. Bascom Giles, Commissioner of the General Land Office, says that the Bexar Scrip file 2692 was missing while O. Henry was in the office but has been replaced by certified copies from Tom Green county where the land is located. The cubicle described in the story actually exists, but Commissioner Giles says there is no basis of fact for the story.

FACTUAL: We observe the anniversary of the United States flag on June 14, and the observance was proclaimed in 1915 by President Wilson.

Q. What is the significance of each of the colors of the United States flag? C. C. S.

A. According to a statement ascribed to George Washington, we take the stars and blue union from heaven, the red from our mother country, separating it by white stripes, thus showing that we have separated from her, and the white stripes shall go down to posterity representing liberty.

FLAG FACTS: The United States flag should be displayed on all days of patriotic observance and on the occasion of visits from high government officials. Schools and public buildings should display the flag every day. It is never correct or permissible to use the flag for merely decorative purposes in any printed, painted, or embroidered design, nor should it ever be worn as a part of any costume or uniform.

Q. I know that the bluebonnet is the official state flower of Texas but was it ever the Golden rod? A. H.

A. The bluebonnet was adopted in 1901 by the Twenty-seventh legislature as the state flower of Texas. The golden rod was never officially proclaimed the state flower.

"In August, 1823, Stephen F. Austin, Baron de Bastrop, a surveyor and some negro slaves surveyed 17 acres on the Colorado river eight miles above the Aatasco crossing to be the capitol of the Municipality of Colorado and the headquarters for all of the Austin colony. That location is the present site of Columbus. W. B. De-wees, known as the founder of Columbus, visited Austin's surveying party while the survey was being made. Austin shortly abandoned this location and selected a similar spot on the Brazos river where he surveyed four leagues of land to be his capitol. The frequency of Indian depredations in this section and the fact that most of his colonists were on the Brazos may have influenced him to make the change. At the suggestion of the Mexican governor in San Antonio the town was named San Felipe de Austin, in joint honor of his patron saint and for Stephen F. Austin."

USE OF THE THERMOMETER

AUSTIN—"One of the most potentially useful gadgets in the home during the winter months is the thermometer. Unfortunately its possibilities as a health guardian are seldom realized by the general public," Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, declares.

In homes where the thermometer is used intelligently it becomes a valuable defense mechanism. As a preventer of colds and more serious respiratory diseases that have their origin directly and indirectly in overheated rooms, it can and does render valiant service.

A maintained superheated atmosphere causes one to perspire, however imperceptible the process may be. When exposed to icy blasts, the body in that condition is more vulnerable to attack from respiratory infective agents than normally. Moreover, the body consequences that arise from constantly living in unduly warm living quarters in themselves are devitalizing.

On the negative side of the question, the sense of comfort associated with excess heat is an invitation to underactivity, which frequently is unwisely accepted. Thus, instead of taking a normal amount of exercise in the open during the winter months, fondness for the indoors becomes acute and "hugging the fire" routine. In this manner the actual life- and zest-building possibilities that go hand in hand with cold weather are shunned, and positive health is less positive than it logically could be.

It is not recommended, of course, that one should adopt a Spartan attitude toward winter. It is merely suggested that exercise in the open in winter is a pleasant medium by which tone is added to one's physical condition. This objective is definitely minimized if the overstuffed chair and overheated living room are chosen as substitutes.

Home Demonstration Work After 6 Months

Maretta Holloway

Questionnaires were sent recently to 193 members of home demonstration clubs to aid in checking on the influence of the work in the county since June, 1940. Although organization of clubs has taken up much of the first few months, making of frame gardens, making of hooked rugs, application of the Texas Food Standard to better balanced meals, improved food preparation practices, and testing of pressure cooker gauges have been stressed as well as other things in the clubs. Returns show 67% have improved food preparation practices through demonstrations or extension bulletins, 64% are using the Texas Food Standard in meal planning, 3215 square feet of except Challis, Happy and Meadow; and girls' clubs have been organized in all schools in the county where there are enough girls enrolled to warrant a club

frame garden have been planted, that of the 82 pressure cookers reported, 42 have been tested for accurateness and safety, and that 16 hand-made rugs have been completed. 136 women and 24 men have taken part in the county's mattress-making program, and during the month of November, 81 mattresses were made.

A study of the Girl's 4-H Club work shows that 69 bonnets have been made by the girls in their club work, and of the Christmas gifts constructed, 96 stuffed toys have been made.

Home Demonstration clubs have been organized in all communities and where the work can be included in the school's schedule.

11,511 quarts of fruits, 11,371 quarts of vegetables, 581 containers of meat, 894 gallons of lard were shown to have been preserved by members of home demonstration clubs throughout the entire year of 1940. 21,175 pounds meat, 1,240 pounds vegetables, 978 pounds lard were shown to have been stored fresh or cured, while 8,588 pounds of meat were and are being stored in the freezer locker

One of the most vivid pieces of Texas newspaper writing seen in quite some time was Bill Pott's recent article in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram telling of a ride in one of the army's newest scout cars, weighing 9,000 pounds, armed with four machine guns, covered with half-inch steel plate yet capable of 60 miles an hour over concrete roads. The marvelous machine raced with a cavalry horse over cactus-studded sand dunes near El Paso:

"This is just like a battlefield torn up," said General Swift as he swung in his saddle to point with sweeping arm to the vast area of waste. "Let's say the enemy is on that high point and we're supposed to circle and attack from the rear. You start."

Wham—we plowed into a small mountain, climbed to the top of it and pitched over, all wheels spinning in the air at once. Then it was up and down and around for what seemed like hours. My seat, flat on the floor of the steel steed, was little more than a bouncing place which the seat of my pants missed as often as it hit, while I clung grimly to dashboard and steel rail around the top of the car. We had gone less than 50 yards when the general sailed nonchalantly by at full gallop, the terrain bothering his horse no more than would a race track. In two minutes he was out of sight.

When we stopped, I untangled myself and climbed unsteadily to the ground. A button had popped off my vest; my tie was askew; my shoe laces were undone; my hat rested in the rear, I'd lost my stomach.

Thus it was proved once more that the horse is still a vital part of national defense. Though declaring they are handicapped by the fact that racing no longer is permitted in the State, Texas thoroughbred breeders are co-operating with the army to provide stallions for the production of cavalry horses.

NATURAL GAS GOOD FUEL BUT BE CAREFUL

AUSTIN, Dec. 16—During the past twenty years, eight out of every ten fire deaths in Texas have occurred in the home, Marvin Hall, state fire insurance commissioner, reported today.

The Commissioner said that \$6,325,000, or approximately 50 percent of the average annual fire loss total of \$12,650,000, resulted from home fires. Gas, properly used, presents no greater hazard than other fuels, but the fact that in Texas natural gas is used in the home extensively for such household purposes as heating, cooking and refrigeration, makes it imperative that the greatest degree of care be exercised by home owners in observing fire prevention rules and regulations in the use of this fuel.

The law in Texas requires that natural gas be odorized and if the odor of escaping gas is detected, windows and doors should be opened, the gas turned off at the meter, and the gas company notified at once. In improperly ventilated rooms, gas heaters will consume all of the oxygen within a few hours and death may be the result.

During the past five years, approximately 15 Texans have lost their lives each year in gas explosions. This figure excludes the 294 school children who died in the New London disaster in 1937.

So far as is known, the first method of "cooking" eggs was that used by the ancient Egyptians. They placed them in a sort of sling in which the eggs were turned rapidly until heated to a certain point. Later, it was discovered how to roast eggs in beds of hot coals. Today, perhaps the best known way of preparing eggs is by "boiling" Yet one should never really boil an egg, say the culinary experts. They claim the best "soft-boiled" eggs are obtained by first bringing the water to a boil, reducing the heat until the water is just below the boiling point, then putting in the eggs and leaving them for from five to eight minutes, according to the taste of the consumer.

SANTA FE CARLOADINGS

The Santa Fe Railway System carloadings for the week ending Dec. 14, 1940, were 19,897 compared with 19,164 for the same week in 1939. Received from connections were 7,114 compared with 5,709 for the same week in 1939. The total cars moved were 27,011 compared with 24,873 for the same week in 1939. The Santa Fe handled a total of 26,671 cars during the preceding week of this year.



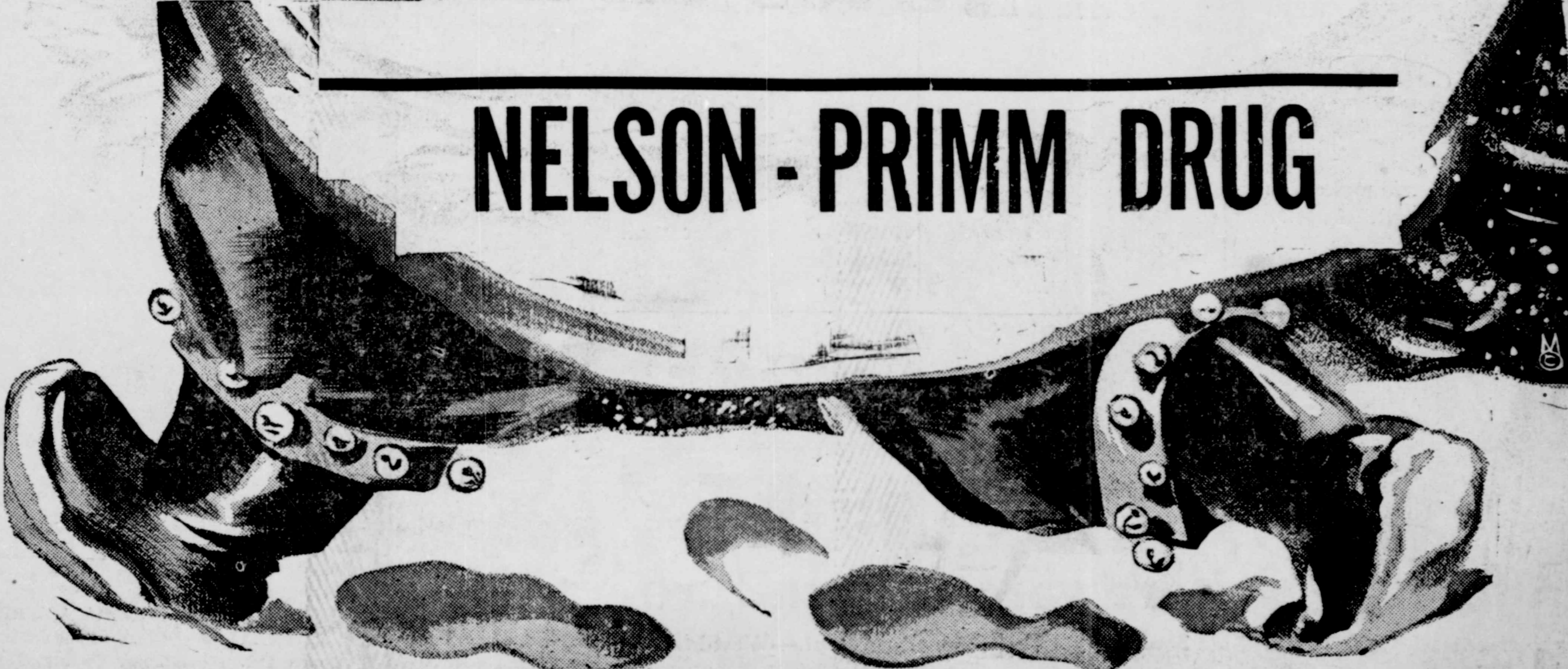
