# HIGH SCHOOL COMMERCIAL DEPT. ONE OF BEST EQUIPPED IN SECTION

The Brownfield High School THEY'RE MR. AND MRS. SMITH Commercial Department, under the direction of Miss Montgomery and Mr. McBrayer, has made rapid progress within the last five years. The department, as it existed five years ago, was composed of one class of Junior Business training, three classes of typing, and one class of shorthand, affiliation for which was granted in 1936.

Five years ago, the total enrollment for typing was 32; at present the enrollment is 96 and would probably be greater if more · room were available to accomodate more students. In 1936, the Brownfield school owned eleven typewriters, most of which were from four to twelve years of age; eight typewriter desks (the rest of the desks were goods boxes and tables); and the chairs were mixtures of stools, folding chairs, with a small mixture of the type chairs which are now used throughout the entire department.

The present typing department owns twenty-seven typewriters; twenty-four are in use in the typing lab, one in the superin-. tendent's office, and one in each of the principal's offices; one adding machine; and a mimeograph machine.

It has been the policy of this department to give the students the best equipment available. In order to give these students this equipment, a typing fee of \$7.00 per school year is charged, if paid in advance, or \$1.00 per month, it paid by the month. Even though each student pays \$1.00 per month, the cost is not prohibitive to students desirous of learning to · type. In terms of cost per lesson, each student 5c, or less per lesson for instruction, rent on a \$115.00 to \$125.00 machine, a \$35 desk, and a \$5.25 chair. This rent is very show. cheap if one considers that typewriters, mostly old models, alone are . rented by typewriter companies for from \$2.50 to \$3.00 per month.

In addition to typing, the Brownfield commercial depart ment offers affiliated courses in In Capturing Theives Bookkeeping, Commercial Law, Commercial Arithmetic, Salesmanship, Junior Business training and Stenography. These courses have increased in enrollment from about fifteen in 1937 to capacity (35 students) at present. There are two sections of some of the courses.

Junior Business training, which is a good course for any Freshman Brownfield, Texas regardless, of what course he wishes to pursue, is a basic course for the other commercial courses. 

SMALL BORROWERS' PILL OFFERED BY FORMER SPEAKER

Austin, Tex., Mar. 18-Representative Emmett Morse of Harris County, former speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, has introduced a bill in the House to protect small borrowers against high interest rates disguised as service charges, commissions, premiums or special fees. The measure would also place personal Lan agencies under strict State regulation. .

The Morse bill provides that persons or corporations engaged in the business of lending small amounts shall obtain licenses from the Commissioner of Banking, pay license fees, make bond for the protection of borrowers and subrit to periodic inspection of their books and accounts. Power to make rules and regulations to protect borrowers from unfair tactics is vested in the commissioner.

Interest is limited to 10 per cent year and all subterfuges intended to increase actual interest are prohibited. Charges for serwices must be for those actually rendered upon particular loans and, in any case, must come within limits set forth in the bill.

## Brooder Houses Should Be Sanitary

College Station, March 19-In stablishing a poultry flock, santation starts before the chicks

Geo. P. McCarthy, Extension poultry husbandman for A. and Jack Stricklin, Jr., Ass't. Mgr. M. College, says the brooder house should be thoroughly cleaned by sweeping walls and ceiling, removing all dirt, and thoroughly disinfecting it with a good commercial disinfectant. A suitable disinfectant can be improvised from one can of concentrated lye in 20 gallons of water-the nearer boiling the better.

The floor and walls of the brooder house should be thoroughly scrubbed up to about two feet above the floor and, if space is available, skid it at least 20 yards to clean ground. Similar practices of sanitation should continue throughout the entire brooding

"There is no place that efforts expended in keeping things clean will pay a larger dividend than in raising chicks."

McCarthy offers chicken raisers these bits of advice and caution: Put the brooder in the house and operate it two days before the chicks arrive. Make sure it holds an even temperature of 95 to 98 degrees two inches from the floor at the edge of the hover. Round off the corners of the nouse to prevent chicks from pil-

ng in corners. Have a fresh supply of chick tarter on hand so chicks can be fed as soon as they arrive. A good commercial buttermilk starting mash is recommended. Don't economize on chick starter mash. Don't buy more chicks than

your house will take care of. Don't allow chicks to become chilled in transporting from the natchery to brooder house.

Don't forget that the brooder house should have an abundance of fresh air without drafts.

# Feather Comforts Out of Feather Beds

County Home Dem. Agent

Feather comforts offer a desirable means of making use of discarded feather beds, as will be shown by the county home demonstration agent, March 22, 2:30 p. m., district court room, Brownfield. This is to be an open meeting for any who are interested in feather comforts.

Approximately three pounds of Boy Scouts and Scoutmaster good quality feathers should be used. It is better if they are goose feathers; the down, of course, makes the best comfort. The feathers may be stripped off the February. mid-rib, or it may be cut out with the scissors. If they are not stripped, all of those with a stiff mid-rib should be discarded.

Be sure the featners are clean. In one county where a number of women wanted to make comforts of old feather beds, a laundry made them a special price for cleaning the feathers. The feathers however, may be washed at home by placing in sacks and sousing through warm suds, never hot suds; use as many suds as necessary until the feathers leave used. To make the comfort, first stitch two widths of the material together, 21/2 yards long, for the top of the cover, and stitch two widths together, 21/2 yards long, for the lining of the comfort. This makes a comfort about 71 inches wide and 89 inches long. Stitch top and lining together along the center seam, then stitch or quilt across from side to side every 9 inches until there are eight pockets on each side 9 inches wide and 351/2 inches deep. There will remain at the bottom of the comfort about 17 inches of material with no feathers. This is good for tucking under the mattress to help hold the comfort on the bed; then, too, why use valuable feathers for tucking under, and the length of most beds is about 72 inches.

Divide the feathers into two equaal parts, using one-half of them for each side of the comfort. Stuff feathers into the pockets, working with one-half of the comfort at a time. Stuff by putting a handful in each pocket and repeating until all the feathers are





MORE REFRIGERATION

Austin, Mar. 18-With 20,000 to 30,000 Texas farms annually intalling electricity, refrigeration of food products for family use is expanding rapidly in rural areas, an agricultural research engineer said at the University of Texas

Speaking to the Texas Food Preservation Conference here, P. T. Montfort, A. & M. College, cited that in areas where electricity has been available for as much as two years more than 50 per cent of the farms are now using electric refrigerators.

"The rapid development of the commercial quick freezing indusry and locker storage facilities has created among Texas farmers a widespread interest in the use of low temperature storage," he said. "They visualize tremendous possibilities for a better utilization of farm resources to improve the diet of the farm family and to increase the net income from many productive enterprises on the farm."

# Mahon Explains The Agricultural

Appropriation In view of the widespread interest of West Texans in the agr cultural appropriation bill which Institute of Life Insurance anpassed the House last week, Con-gressman George Mahon has reported from Washington as fol-

The largest item in the bill is \$500,000,000 for AAA soil conservation payments to farmers; \$212,-000,000 is provided for so-called parity payments. These sums are about the same as provided in previous years.

Of special interest will be the \$100,000,000 in loans for the expansion of the rural electrification program for the coming fiscal year, and an increase to enable the Soil Conservation Service to cooperate more adequately with soil conservation districts in Texas.

The bill provides \$50,000,000 in leans for the continuation of the farm tenant purchase program. The bill now goes to the Senate

for consideration and there seems to be no doubt but that appropriations made by the House will be approved.
