

To The Terry

County Herald: After having been out of circulation for three weeks because of the mumps I am again in harness as a soldier. Uncle Sam really takes good care of his soldiers when they get sick. Here at Fort Bliss the Army has a fine modern General Hospital and a staff of doctors and nurses who are as competent and skilled as can be found anywhere. While the soldier is in the hospital his pay continnes and the services of the doctors, aurses and all hospital expenses cost him nothing. Mothers and fathers who have sons in the Army can rest assured that they will receive the finest of medical and nursing care if they become ill while a member of the Army.

A couple of days ago the thousand odd men now at this Reception Center were informed that most of them would remain here or the next two months instead of being shipped out to replacement centers for advance training. Uncle Sam's Army is growing faster than he can take care of them and my information is that no more men are to be drafted until June or July. 


