First to catch one's eye possibly are the 48 grape vines orderly arbored southwest of the house. Mrs. Hemme, home food supply demonstrator for the Meadow Home Demonstration Club says she used 300 lbs. sugar last year in preserving the grapes which vere not soid. North of the grape olot is the 15' x 35' strawberry ced which is going into its third year and has paid for itself in strawberries. The bed is protected on the west and north only by rees. The Gem Everbearing is the variety berry planted and has proved itself hardy and profitable on the Hemme place. And what s more, Mrs. Hemme is often called on to furnish strawberry plants to others in the community who are interesting themselves in putting out strawberries, these being planted, when no protection is available, in frame gardens. Other fruit is furnished by the 18 fruit trees which are in bloom and a lovely sight to see. There are three apple, eight plums, and peach trees.



> Parity payments, based on the soil, Mr. Looe Miller explained. normal yields on allotted acreages, will be made at the rate of 1.38 cents per pound on cotton. Farmers who participate in the 1941 AAA program and plant within their cotton acreage allotments are eligible to receive payments at these rates, he declared.

In addition to parity payments, cooperating farmers will receive conservation payments based on the normal yield of the farm acreage allotments. As previously announced, conservation rates for 1941 are 1.38 cents per pound on cotton and an average of 90c per acre on general soil-depleting crops for Terry county. All payments are subject to deductions if acreage allotments are over-

Farmers, also, may earn payments under the Agricultural Conservation Program for carrying out approved soil-building practices up to the maximum at lowance available to the farm. In most cases, this information has been made available to the farmer on his 1941 farm plan sheet. And those farmers that have not signed farm plan sheets may do so by calling at this office.
