This Week In **National Defense**

President Roosevelt, in a letter to the Office of Production Management which said the nation is confronted with a "critical situation," ordered all available machines pooled for defense work on a 24-hour day, 7-day week schedule, with time out only for repairs The President also asked the OPM to recanvass the nation, including the armed forces, for skilled workers to operate the machines. No effort or justifiable expense should be spared, the President said.

OPM Production Director Biggers, speaking in Washington, said national defense progress "seems phenomenal" but vast increases are still necessary. He said airplane production which has been trebled since May 1940 must again be doubled before the end of 1941; machine gun production which has been quadrupled, must be increased 1,000 per cent.

Defense Needs First Blackwell Smith, Assistant Priorities Director, said in a speech in Washington: "We cannot have business as usual so long as we must pay first attention to defense needs."





Peoria, Ill., from Washington en route to Chicago and then, after a press conference, I went out to see one of the housing projects built under the U.S. housing authority. Everyone with whom I talked, had the highest praise for Mr. Nathan

Straus and the work which has been accomplished under his leadership. The particular project which I saw was practically completed, except for the landscaping.

There are two types of buildings, three story apartment houses and two story small houses. The rents are remarkably reasonable, far below the average for substandard housing in Peoria. I am sure all the officials are very pleased with what has been accomplished.

Later, I met the staff of the WPA for the district. I was very much interested to hear an account of the Workers Service project, which has just been operating during the past two months. They have set up centers of information for the workers, and they seem to have been able to make these centers very useful in the short time they have been open.

A number of the British Relief people, among them two small girls dressed in Scotch kilts, came at five o'clock to shake hands with me. I was glad to see Mrs. Johnson, who remembered having entertained the President and me in the

leave her many lonely hours, for they go to work or to school. The man who earns a living out here must spend much time alone. Even the youngsters must have occasions when they know what it is like to see no other human being anywhere

It must be hard sometimes, and yet I think it must give one a sense of self-reliance. Perhaps the nearness to the soil and the great outdoors puts iron into their souls.

I have read the American Red Cross report on war relief, and I think we can be proud of the record that the help made available by and through the Red Cross up to March 1 totaled in value \$22,981,942. I was glad to note that relief to Finland had increased last month, but I was extremely sorry to note in the papers that a shipload of Red Cross supplies bound for Greece had come to grief on its voyage. Somehow, one feels that no Red Cross supplies should be war casualties.

There is a new quarterly magazine called "The Land," published by "Friends of the Land," which should be on everybody's table. It is a magazine which hopes to make us all conservation conscious, because people go down and come up with their land, and ours needs to

Finally, I read a pamphlet called 'Britain Under Fire." It is a collection of articles written by John Cowles, president of the Minneapolis Star Journal. I have read some before but gathered together in this way, they make impressive reading. One of them in particular interested me. It is called "What Will The Peace Terms Be?" I think these two paragraphs are worth

much thought on our part: "English trades unions and labor party leaders, who are co-operating completely with the Churchill government, have as one of their basic airns the re-establishment of strong, free trades unions in Germany as a bulwark against future mili-

"To attain this end, they say Britain must help build a sound and thriving national economy in postwar Germany."







Conservation Increases Yields

Amarillo, Apr. 5 - "Contour farming and terracing are among the most useful farming measures ever introduced to dry land agriculture," states R. E. Uhland of the Soil Conservation Service, in a recent pamphlet issued by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, entitled "Better Harvests through Conservation Farming."

The pamphlet gives numerous examples where contour tillage and terracing have increased crop yields by storing rainfall in the ground instead of permitting it to run off into streams. It gives a graphic summary of the benefits of contouring and terracing to the Texas. yields of cotton, beans, wheat, and grain sorghums, in the Southern Great Plains.

At Spur, Texas, the yield of lint cotton on contoured and terraced fields, over an eleven-year period, was 68 more pounds per acre than on land farmed in Clovis, N. M., and Channing, Perryton, Stratford and Vega, Texas, farmed parallel to the section from these figures.





for defense orders.

Labor Disputes

Secretary of Labor Perkins reported strikes have declined to a point where less than two-tenths of one per cent of defense workers—or 7,800 persons—are affected. Selective Service headquarters advised local boards they are not justified in reclassifying workers joining a strike in a defense industry.

Labor Supply

The Social Security Board reported shortages of labor in certain machine shop occupations, shipbuilding and boilermaking and an increasing need for electrical mechanical and optical instrument makers and wood patternmakers. The Labor Department reported 290,000 workers given employment in one month and said that 310,000 additional workers will be needed by September, 1942, in shipyards alone. The Civil Service Commission announced that persons up to 65 years old are now eligible for Federal trades and artisan po-

Cost of Living

Secretary of Labor Perkins reported living costs of moderate income families in March were 2.6 percent higher than before war started in Europe. She reported price rises in sugar, coffee, pork, butter, canned vegetables and certain fresh fruits and vegetables, rents, clothing and house furnishings.

Consumer Commissioner Harriet Elliott warned that some manufacturers were maintaining unchanged prices by lowering the quality of their products. Defense Housing

President Roosevelt approved legislation authorizing a \$150,-000,000 expansion of the defense housing program and asked Congress for \$15,000,000 to purchase 14,200 portable houses, 6,900 dormitory units and an obsolete passenger ship to house defense workers during the housing emergency. Mr. Roosevelt reported \$5,000,000 previously appropriated for emergency purposes in addition to \$447,000,000 for the regular defense housing program had been used for 7,300 dormitory units and 3,800 trailers.

Aid to Democracies

The President told a press conference he has ordered a survey to ascertain what, if any, planes may be procured immediately from civilian airlines. Navy Secretary Knox told a press conference the Navy has no combat ships available now for transfer to Great Britain, but that more high-speed "mosquito boats" will be turned over to the British as they come off assembly lines.

Treasury Secretary Morgenthau announced an arrangement under which the U. S. will contribute \$50,000,000, the United Kingdom, 5,000,000 pounds sterling, and China, 20,000,000 U. S. dollars, to

a Chinese currency stabilization fund to be managed by a five-man board including a U. S. representative.

Shipping

President Roosevelt requested U. S. Maritime Commission Chairman Land to arrange a pool of at least 2,000,000 tons of existing merchant shipping which could be used to carry "food and the munitions of war to the democracies of the world." Admiral Land said the shipping would be drawn from the intercoastal trade, Army and Navy auxiliary ships, the laid-up fleet, requisitioning of foreign vessels in U.S. ports and re-routing of commercial shipping regardless of the resulting inconvenience and loss of trade.

Defense Financing
The Treasury Department placed

on sale U. S. savings bonds and postal savings stamps designed to btain money for defense financing and provide investments for all citizens as a "cushion" against possible post defense depression. Federal Reserve Board Chairman Eccles said taxes should be planned to discourage consumer purchases of such items as automobiles, refrigerat .. and furniture in order to kuild a back-log of purchasing power for use after the emergency. He also said that although higher taxes on personal income will be necessary, most taxes should be collected from business, "where the profits orig-
