Texas is soon to elect a United States Senator, a Federal officer. He will be this State's contribution to the Statesmanship of the Nation, a member of the greatest body in the __ation, perhaps the world. What will we send them? The Senate deals with the weal or the woe of the entire nation. They sit on the safety valve of National legislation, we think sometimes too tight. They indeed are the upper house, supposed to be composed of conservative reasonable men well versed in Statecraft. They are lawmakers of the Nation. The original plan was that the Representatives (Congressmen) represented the people of their districts, the Senators represent the State and the Nation. Think of the many and varied important problems confronting them. And new ones arising all the time. In recent years our Government has become very complicated. It is composed of such a variety of multiplicities, and such multiplicity of varieties, that no one-ideaed man can fit in. No one voter, in fairness to his fellow citizen ought to exact predominance of his one hobby. Though elected by Texas, a Senator is a National officer.

In the United States Senate, a warhorse (to match the one we have), not a songbird. We need a man with reason, not with resin. A man of vision, not verse. One who can wade through briars, thorns and rocky obstacles, as well as through flower beds, and one with a ceiling high enough to climb the mountain problems, ever emerging in our National affairs.

We've had our myrth and music, fun and fables, in the last several years, now let's get down to business. This is a serious matter. This office is a great trust and National service. It isn't a sports-trophy to be handed to a mere winner. We can get good music, every nour, day and night over radios (north of the border). We can read our Bible every night, go to the Church of our choice every Sunday, where able ministers, well versed in the scriptures, can feed the hungry soul, but we can get Statesmanship, only at the polls, ever so seldom.


