J. M. Telford, president of the board informed us that as soon as architects' blue prints were ready, bids would be let for the occupy the site purchased to cost around \$75,000, containing 16 rooms. But when it came to the remodeling of the West Ward, and making a practically new building of it, the trustees ran up against' a proposition. In the first place, the bids were somewhat higher than expected, although there were several bids. But the real Jonah was the fact that no contractor would take the job with the promise or agreement that the building would be ready for occupancy when school begins the 1941-42 term in September. Mr. Telford informed us that the buildings would possibly be used as is until school is out next spring again, when the remodeling will take place. Butler & Houseman of Lubbock are the buildings architects.





An inquiring reporter once made check at the Commerce, War and Navy Departments and discovered that three times as much coffee is consumed per capita by service men-soldiers, sailors and marines-as by civilians.

His inquiry also showed that bluejackets and marines who serve at sea consume an average of 36 pounds of coffee a year, or about two pounds more than that consumed by soldiers.






It is a lovely drive though, along winding Connecticut roads with many glimpses of small lakes and



Reports Good Time On Visit Home

Thursday Evening Reception Center Ft. Bliss, Texas

The switch-back from the life days of pleasant visiting in Brownfield is is rather hard to get back into the swing of the life of soldier but it has to be done.

I enjoyed every moment of my visit home and regret only that t had to be so short and that I didn't have time to see every one trying to see everfone reminded me of my political race last year when I tried to see everyone in the county "afoot" and found it couldn't be done. I believe that before Uncle Sam gets thru with me I will be in shape from the marching I am doing to walk to every farm house in the county without working up a sweat.

The interest that my infrequent letters have aroused at home came as a surprise to me. I started writing them to the 'Old He' hoping he would print them and save me this "three-seventy" daily pay I'm getting (three square meals and 70c per day) I can't afford too many stamps. I hope that you who read this letter will consider t as a personal letter to you and would make me feel mighty good if you would drop me a card or a letter now and then. A one sided correspondence is seldom very interesting and if you would write me and ask questions about interest to you I know that I can make my letters more interesting. You say you enjoy my letters, I know I would enjoy yours so start

When I fell out for reville this morning I found out that Horace Beck, the late ink monkey on Jack's paper, had been transferred to the Induction Station at the main post. George Cartwright told me that they stuck a typewriter in front of him and told him to go to work. Beck told them he wasn't a typist but a linotype operator and they told him that he was on the verge of becoming a typist. Such is the Army!

About eighty men were shipped to California while I was on my 'holiday" but no Terry County boys were in the group. Just how much longer Cartwright and Turner will remain in the Reception Center is impossible to say. They may be transferred tomorrow and it may be a week or more. Both of them look more like old timers than recruits and both have that spanked baby complextion which marks the Ft. Bliss soldier.

The talk and enthusiasm I heard and saw about and over Brownfield's Home Guard Unit really made me feel fine and warm inside. In too many parts of our country those people who are not in the armed forces have only the idea of "business and profits" as usual and are doing nothing to make themselves a part of the gigantic defense effort which is now sweeping our nation. We soldiers like to feel that the folks back home are with us in spirit and thought and the work being done in the Brownfield Home Defense Guard is concrete proof to us that you are with us and are willing to make sacrifices just as we have been called on to do. and we will soon have an end of the criminal things which are happening to hamper and slow down our defense efforts. It is no secret that soldiers, as well as Home Guards, are drilling with wooden guns and in a great industrial nation such as ours such condition is shameful and inexcusable. We must have arms and machines to train and fight with and it is up to the civilians to see that we get them.
