Methodist People And Friends To Meet Sunday In Their Beautiful New Church

This Building Has Been Both Remodeled And Enlarged A Great Change Has Been Wrought In Looks And Utility. Everyone Invited To Attend The Opening Sessions Sunday.

The Methodist people will gather at their newly remodeled church Sunday, after spending the past two months in the school building. From all outside appearances, as well as inside for that matter, one would never know but that it was a new building from basement to roof, and it mostly is. The remodeling of the older part of the building has been a fine job, and the new part added so nicely that really it has no resemblance whatever to the original part of this building, erected back in 1924.

The Original Building

However, the real original church building was at one time the school building, until the town grew to such an extent by 1907 or 1908, that the school erected a building or four rooms west of where the railroad now is, and the old school building was then sold to the Methodist people. Not being any too well built, and moved to the site belonging to the congregation the building never was any too steady on its pins, and finally had to be anchored to keep a sandstorm from pitching it over. The bell belfry was about the largest part of the building and made it top heavy. As stated above, this building was used until about 1924, after the railroad came.

Early Day Pastors Fine Men

The first pastor was J. A. Sweeney, but when we arrived on the scene in 1909, Rev. P. E. Riley was the pastor. He is now pastor of the First church in Corsicana. Riley at one time was a presiding elder, headed the Clarendon College for some time, and was also at one time Editor of the Christian Advocate. Other early day pastors were Victor Trammell, Charley and Almus Jamerson, J. B. Reynolds and J. M. Fryar. The present pastor, H. W. Hanks came here two years ago, and has been very instrumental in helping in the drive for this new and modern plant. He very obligingly showed us through the new building.

Don't Look Like Same Place

If you were ever in the Methodist church before the remodeling of the older part, and the construction of the connected educational plant, you will not know the new building. In the first place, the walls of the building has been raised 3 1-2 feet higher, and the roof made much steeper, which displaced the "squat" appearance, which in itself is a 100 per cent improvement. The interior of the auditorium is another revelation. The old tin ceiling has been raised several feet, and replaced with celotex. Hardwood floors have been added throughout and the altar, pulpit and choir seating arrangements changed for the better in both convenience and beauty. In fact their architect has done his stuff well, and their matches with the main auditorium will seat in the neighborhood of 600 people.

Educational Plant Well Planned

By using a few feet of mother earth, the educational plant is a two story affair, and architecturally matches with the main auditorium. The first story protrudes far enough above the ground to be well ventilated and will receive sufficient natural light on any clear day without the use of artificial lighting. In all, there are 19 class rooms upstairs and down stairs, all well arranged for ventilation and light. Floors are hardwood throughout, with celotex ceiling, which will reduce noises to the minimum. In the basement is the kitchen, and a large, well planned banquet hall. Fluorescent lighting will be used throughout the building, and rest rooms are placed convenient for all parts of the plant.

We wish it was possible to get a good picture of the building, but with the rank growth of the trees about the building this year, that is almost impossible thing to do until the leaves are shed this

fall. In connection with this article the church authorities are arranging a suitable program, and you are invited to meet with them Sunday, and help them enjoy their new building.

In conclusion, we might state that when the writer came here 22 years ago, the Methodist people had the only church building in town. But they were not the least

bit stingy with their little building. Baptist, Church of Christ and Presbyterian ministers were welcome to use it any time they liked. Everybody went to church services of any nature in those days, for it took all to make a sizeable congregation and all had their Sunday school together at the little Methodist church building.

Bounty On Wolf Scalps To Be Extended

July 31, has been set as the dead line for bounty on wolf scalps. All wolves killed in July will be considered by the Terry County Commissioner's Court at their August 11th meeting.

Judge Lincoln says that to date there has been bounty paid on 170 scalps. This drive which has lasted for the last 90 days has grown out of the request of the County Land Use Planning Committee that steps be taken to reduce the loss in the county due to wolves' destroying turkeys and chickens.

Judge Lincoln stated Monday that the Commissioners' Court had decided to extend the bounty on wolf scalps the rest of the year 1941.

Can All You Possibly Can This Year

That food is high and getting higher almost every day, is quite plain to housewives and others who buy for the family. It is also a fact being pointed out by local grocers, who tell us that the specials they put on Saturdays at certain prices in most cases cannot be replaced in the shelves next week at the same price. Therefore, it behooves all who can to can.

All fruits that are canned in glass jars will also save tin that can be used in defense projects. Your grocers or hardware men in most cases will be able to get all the cans in all standard sizes that you need. Canning should be composed, of course, of both fruit and vegetable, including a lot of the leafy varieties of the later. That is sometimes a problem in this section, but usually turnips tops do well here in the fall.

Such vegetables and fruits are supposed to contain all the vitamins from A to Z whatever they are. But before we heard of a vitamin we learned that vegetables contained much iron and was good for the human being to eat.

From press dispatches, we learn that in the real peach growing sections of the state, the growers are trying to get the government interested in the distribution of these wholesome fruits. There is one trouble, however. In most cases peaches that have been shipped in here are over ripe, and a big waste found. The price is rather high too. The bushel that this family bought turned out about three gallons of good fruit after the waste was cut out. They cost \$1.45. That is rather high for three jars of peaches, and some trouble too.

If you possibly can, buy from local growers. In that way you can get your peaches at just the right stage to can or preserve with little waste, and the price is better, as you go to the orchard after them.

While it is deplorable that any person would stoop so low as to steal or attempt to steal anything being contributed to such a worthy cause, the training the Company receive the past several days will by all means prove highly beneficial in any possible future emergency.

Company D Guards Aluminum Collection

After a reported pilferage of the aluminum which has been gathered for defense from the city and from over the county and deposited in a pen on the north side of the square, Company D of the Texas Defense Guard was called on to post sentries at the concentration point. Every individual in the Company served from one to three periods. The aluminum was under guard every night beginning Thursday night of last week and ending Tuesday morning. The first sentries went on duty at 8:00 p. m., and came off at 6:00 a. m., each sentry being on duty for two hours and then off for the night. Except for Tuesday night, only two posts were established. On Tuesday night, however, eight posts were established and every man who had not served the previous night or was not excused from duty was used to guard them, each man serving for one hour. This procedure was in effect until midnight, at which time, sentries were removed from all posts except the original two, the sentries on these posts going back to the regular schedule of two hours duty. The jury rooms in the Court House served as the guard house.

While the men had no little fun and fellowship in the guardhouse, they were strictly business while on duty, each man walking his post "in a military manner." All the men welcomed the opportunity to serve on guard duty and the officers of the Company are well pleased with this fine show of spirit.

LOCAL PEOPLE MORE THAN PLEASED WITH THE BIG ALUMINUM DRIVE

Most Every Organization In The County Had A Hand In Making A Success Of The Drive. Home Defense Guardsmen On Duty To Protect The Costly Metal

Everyone here from Judge C. L. Lincoln, who headed the drive in Terry county, the rural ladies clubs, Boy Scouts, Texas Home Guard, civic and study clubs, and all private individuals who helped in any way, are rejoicing at the showing made in Terry county in gathering the old aluminum that had been discarded about the homes throughout the county. As a result of the drive, Judge Lincoln estimates that some 2500 pounds of the essential metal for defense has been gathered up, and Terry county people have registered a pretty hard kick in the region of Hitler's pant seat.

The precious metal, which included pots and pans, salt and pepper shakers, old discarded washing machines, pressure cookers, auto cylinder blocks, and what have you was piled high in the pen built for that purpose on the north side of the courthouse park. This metal will be hauled to Lubbock one day this week and added to that of this entire area, Lubbock being designated as one of the several concentration points in the area. Judge Lincoln stated Tuesday afternoon that the committees were more than pleased, and that they wanted the people to know just how much they appreciated the cooperation of the people through the entire county.

Texas Man Chosen As New President Of Lions International

George R. Jordan of Dallas, Texas, was unanimously elected president of the International Association of Lions clubs at its 25th annual convention in New Orleans Louisiana, which closed July 25. Jordan succeeds retiring president Karl M. Sorrick of Springfield, Michigan.

According to the report made by Melvin Jones, founder and secretary-general of the association,

the convention in New Orleans concluded one of the most successful years in the history of Lions International. He reported the establishment of 453 new Lions clubs and the addition of 9,680 members for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1940, and ending June 30 1941, which raised the total number of clubs to 4,082 and the membership to 147,407.

In accepting the presidency Jordan said that 4,082 well - organized and functioning clubs in eight countries, comprising 147,407 representative business and professional men would meet, with precision and a definitely outlined course, their responsibilities as good citizens and Lions during the years ahead. He stated that these Lions accept with optimism the challenge for leadership in their respective cities and communities during these perilous times.

Traffic Deaths Show Increase Over 1940

With 140 traffic deaths reported for June State Police statisticians today announced a seven per cent increase in Texas fatalities for the first six months of 1941.

In the first half of 1940 there were 787 deaths; this year the toll for that period rose to 843, an increase of 56.

Worst record was made by towns of under 2,500 population, where fatalities jumped 29 per cent, from 38 to 49.

Highway deaths increased from 429 to 514, a gain of 85 or 20 per cent.

Thirty two fewer persons were killed on country roads, where the toll was reduced from 138 to 106, a drop of 32 or 23 per cent.

Clips recorded a bare reduction of four per cent with a saving of eight lives, their toll dropping from 182 to 174.

Military personnel was involved—either as drivers, passengers or pedestrians—in 10 per cent of all the fatal collisions, said Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., State Police director.

Connally Bill Would Increase Old Age Pay

Washington, D. C., July 23, 1941—Tom Connally Senior Senator from Texas, has introduced a bill to increase the Federal Government's share in old age assistance payments. The bill has been referred to the Senate Committee on Finance, of which Senator Connally is a top ranking member.

Dr. A. J. Altmeyer, Chairman of the Social Security Board, testifying before a Senate Committee on Monday, approved and endorsed the Connally Bill and stated that it represented the views of the Board.

In 1939, the Connally amendment to the Social Security Act, providing for the payment of two dollars by the Federal Government to each one dollar by the State governments, passed the Senate, but was eliminated in the Conference Committee due to ob-

jections from the Social Security Board.

The present bill has been worked out by the joint efforts of Senator Connally and the Social Security Board members. The bill does not carry a flat rate to be paid by the Federal government, but provides a mathematical formula for payments to be made in reverse ratio to the State's per capita income. Thus, the State, with higher average individual incomes is more able to pay its share of the pension, and the less the Federal government will contribute, while the poorer the State, the more the Federal Government will contribute.

Under the present law, there is considerable discrepancy in the amount paid to the aged in the various states; this bill would tend to bring about a more equal pay to the old age pensioner throughout the nation.

Heretofore in Texas, monthly old age pension payments have been a little less than \$14. On that

basis, under the Connally Bill, the combined payments would be \$22.50. Under recent enactments of the Legislature of Texas, if funds are available, the monthly payments would amount to \$18.50. Under the terms of the Connally Bill, with the same State contribution, the monthly payments would amount to \$27.75 to each old age pensioner.

Storage Rates For 1941 Loan Cotton Are Announced

College Station, July 28, — The maximum warehousing rates for 1941 loan cotton are 17 1-2 cents a bale per month for warehouses that do not operate compress facilities and 15 cents a bale per month for warehouses operating compress facilities, B. F. Vance, administrative officers of the state AAA, has announced.

In addition to these charges, Vance said, warehouses may not collect more than 25 cents per bale service charge for receiving, sampling, and delivering, and 10 cents a bale for each service of reweighing and re-sampling. As customary in past loan programs, the cotton producer will also pay a fee of 15 cents a bale for classing which is done by the Agricultural Marketing Service.

At the time service is authorized by the person having title to the warehouse receipts, compression charges will be made at rates specified in the warehouseman's established tariff in effect at that time but will not be in excess of the tariff rate of July 1, 1941. Delivery charges for cotton on which compression charges are not collected, may also be made by warehouses that operate compress facilities, the AAA official said, but no delivery charge will be made if the cotton is delivered to a consuming mill within 50 miles of the warehouse plant.

Fire insurance for the full market value of the cotton will be carried by the warehouseman and if his established tariff provides for rates lower than the maximum rates, the lower rates will apply. In the event county AAA committees authorize it, warehousemen may make out loan papers for an agreed fee.

Storage and fire insurance rates for 1938 loan cotton will be continued under the existing warehousing contracts with a maximum rate of 12 1-2 cents per bale. The maximum rate for 1940 loan cotton is 15 cents per bale until July 31, 1941, when a 12 1-2 cents per bale storage will be in effect.

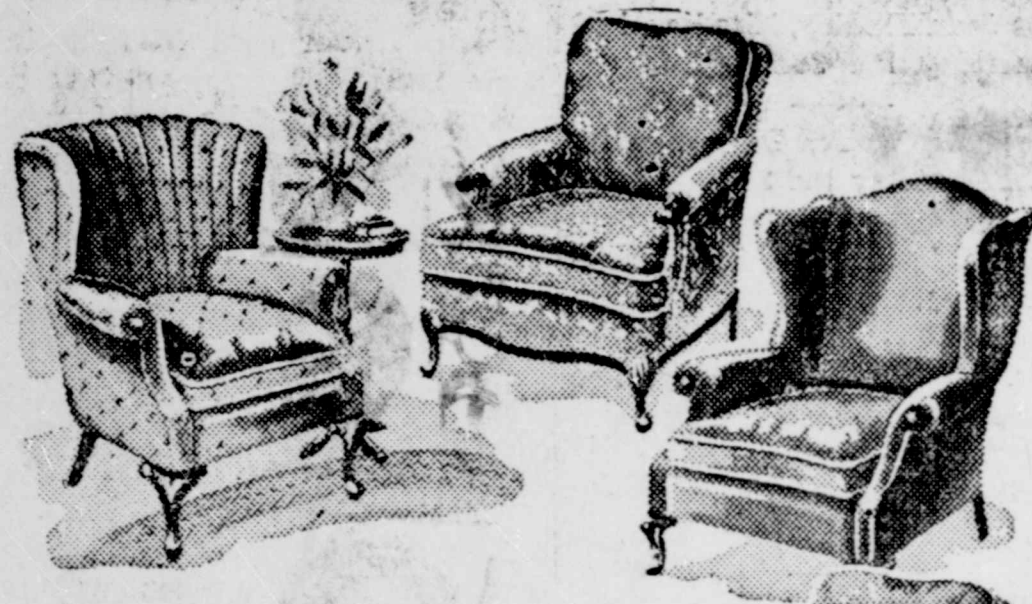

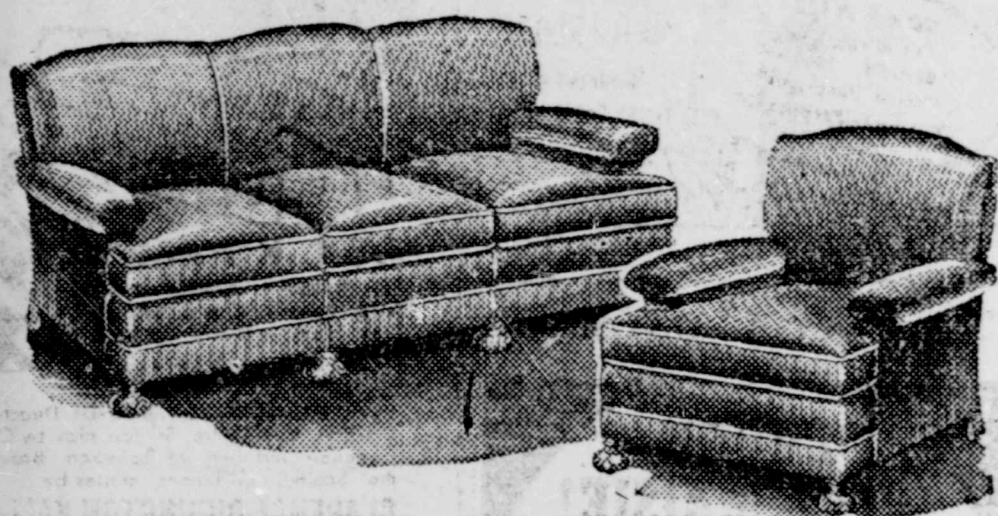

Better Diets For A Stronger People

Nutrition or "Better diets for a stronger people, has become one of the most important sectors of the "Foods for Defense" campaign of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, according to Mrs. Dorothy M. Nevels, Home Management Supervisor for the Farm Security Administration in Terry and Yoakum Counties.

With a nutrition unit to be organized in every county in the nation, the Farm Security Administration is pledged to take its part in the program, and will work in Terry and Yoakum counties in cooperation with other agencies.

Regional staff members of the FSA in this region have outlined the special part of the FSA program as including:

1. To increase the consumption of vegetables.
2. To change and improve old and inherited food habits.
3. To induce the production and use of more eggs, milk, and vegetables and other "protective" foods.
4. To supplement diets with food to which farm families are accustomed but which are not used with best effects.
5. To work not only for production but distribution, education and bridging the gap between low incomes and needs.

6. To link diet necessities with fundamental needs like longer tenure of land which will develop pasture, diversification, soil, enrichment and improvement of living conditions generally.

"Farm Security borrower-families", Mrs. Nevels said, "will be urged to grow bigger fall gardens. Every effort will be made to enrich the diets of the low income families in our program. Although this campaign has become a national movement, we feel that a special obligation rests upon the Farm Security Administration."

"The work of the FSA, perhaps more than any other agency, lies among the groups of the lowest income, among them whom is likely to be found the greatest number of persons undernourished to the extent that an alarming number of its youths are found to be un-

Spinach, Turkeys, Sulphur, Highways, pipe Lines, Beef cattle, Cotton seed, Carbon Black, Land in Farm, Sorghum Grains, Railroad Mileage, Number of Farms, Mineral production, acres of cultivated land and number of domestic animals.

FIND 4 TIMBER WOLF PUPS

Despite efforts of several state departments, including the Game Department, to eradicate timber wolves, there are still a few of huge beasts in Texas. Four were dug out of a den near Crockett, in East Texas, recently after the mother had been caught in a trap. Two of them were killed by dogs, but the other pair are now in the zoo at Beaumont.

attests to the fact that Texas still has a variety of wildlife, although some of it is not desirable. A game warden in the Panhandle reported recently that he had killed nine huge rattlesnakes within a period of six weeks. The largest was 6 feet, 2 inches in length and had a circumference of twelve inches. Four other rattlers each measured more than five feet in length.

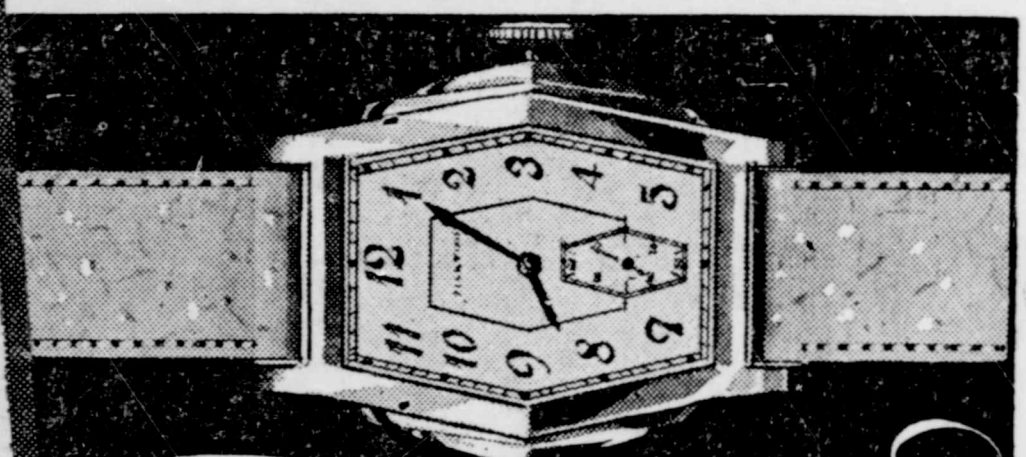

While they have not done much singing as a group, I found they showed signs of getting together and really enjoying it. We have several young people with very nice voices and several who play the piano.

Dr. and Mrs. David Levy lunched with us and after lunch we went back to join the students and listen to Mr. MacLeish, who read a commencement address which he delivered this spring, and his poem: "America Was Promises." To hear him read, either prose or poetry, is an unforgettable experience. It was so beautiful that I think that everyone present felt that, in applauding, they were breaking a spell of beauty which had been cast about them.

At about 3:30 Mr. and Mrs. MacLeish left and then I listened to a discussion between Justice Frankfurter and some of the students on the need for political organizations. To my joy, when we returned to our own house, I found that our son, Jimmy, and his wife had arrived. Soon after, Mrs. Henry Morgenthau Jr. came, having flown up from New York city under somewhat uncertain weather conditions. The fog here was thick until about five o'clock, when it suddenly began to clear and the setting sun shone through a rift in the clouds on the water, making the mouth of the river look like a pool of gold.

One evening, I read aloud some selections of rather lighter poetry, ending up with one serious group from "John Brown's Body," by Stephen Vincent Benet, after which the students began to ask for poems which were special favorites. I was interested to find how many young people read poetry for pleasure. One of them asked me to bring some poems by Langston Hughes, another would like me to read Hood's "The Song of the Shirt."

BOSTON STOP

As soon as I reached Boston one day, I was greeted by Johnny and Anne. We had a very satisfactory visit and were joined a little later by Franklin Jr. I telephoned my husband and we spent some little time catching up on news of all the different members of the family. He had Ruth and her two children in the White House and I wished I could be in two places at once, for I would love to see her and Chandler and Elliott Jr.

All too soon, the message came that Professor Zimmerman was waiting for me downstairs and Mrs. Morgenthau, Miss Thompson and I went out with him to Cambridge. There we had a delightful dinner at the Faculty club and I enjoyed talking to my two neighbors, Mr. Jerome Green and Mr. Mather. At 8:00, we went over to the evening session of the Institute on the Children of Tomorrow. This was the first of three days of meetings. It seems to be a very well-attended institute. They told me there was probably some one from every state in the Union present.

After speaking, I had a short talk with the reporters and then came back to the Statler hotel, where I spent some time discussing their interests with a group of students, who are planning to go to South America. They have two months at Harvard under the direction of Mr. Louis Quintavilla and then, I believe, six weeks to two months in Mexico.

STUDENT CONFERENCE

One day during the week I attended another interesting session of the International Students' Service conference in Campobello, N. B. We spent most of the meeting listening to Justice Frankfurter addressing the Summer Student Leadership institute. In the morning, he made a remarkably clear and simple statement of what law means in a civilized society and what the background of our own law is in this country.

He started out by telling us that he could not talk for an hour, since he was trained in the Harvard law school method of making the pupils do the work. Therefore, he would expect the students being trained for leadership here, to behave in the same way and to carry the burden by asking questions after he had talked briefly. This was at 10:30, and at 12:15 he suddenly looked at Dr. William Allen Neilson, president of Smith college, and asked: "What time is it?" He had been as interested as the listeners and I do not think anyone there had taken any account of the passage of time.

VISIT TO NYA PROJECT

We returned to our seats and spent an hour questioning him immediately after lunch. Then all of us got into a boat and went to Eastport, Maine, to visit the Quoddy village. Many of the young people at our institute had never seen an NYA resident project. I found some of them watching the boys at work in the aviation unit, rather enviously, I thought. Finally, one of them said: "I'd like to be here if I was not at Campobello."
