However, in our drive out Sunday, we noted that the majority of farmers were obtaining poison of some kind and were using it. The plant is not badly ravished at present, but it will be if something is not done to stop them.

It is far better to start before they have made a headway, being cheaper in the long run. Seventeen cent cotton is worth a supreme effort to save.

Wants 900 Million

Declaring that no industry can pay out more than it takes in and emain in business, the Conference Committees representing American Railroads in the pending wage negotiations, today advised leaders of railroad labor that the railroads are unable to grant their demands for increases in pay.

The five operating brotherhoods have asked for a thirty per cent increase, with a minimum increase of \$1.80 per day, while the non-operating groups of employes have demanded an incease of 30 cents an hour, with a minimum wage of 70 cent an hour.

"This case", said Fred G. Gurley, speaking for the conference Committees, "has become generally known as the "thirty per cent" case. It should be known as the 'forty per cent" to railroad wage

Nine hundred million dollars per year is about what is being demanded, said Gurley. That is more than the railroads have ever had in net income in any one year and twice as much as all the net income that the railroads have had in the last ten years.

"Had these demands been in effect in 1940, instead of a small net income for all the railroads, there would have been a net deficit of more than 600 millions.



WORLD EVENTS World events seem to be moving in more satisfactory fashion these days. One cannot help hoping that sometime before long we may read that people who once thought that war was the only way to bring about

satisfactory solutions to world difficulties may have reached the conclusion that there are possibilities of mutual co-operation. Acceptance of the fact that we are dependent upon each other, not only as individuals but as nations, for our well-being and that the ultimate solution of world problems will require a willingness to agree to this precept, seems the first step forward toward a peaceful world.

In these closing days of the International Student Service institute in Eastport, Maine, the question of the way to make democracy meet not only our own needs, but world needs, has been discussed by Dr. Eagleton and the students. Much interest and real thinking on the problem, I hope, will result.





Behind the Scenes in **American Business**

NEW YORK, Aug 11-SIMMER-ING-Price control legislation, the new tax bill and eastern gas rationing all have sort of settled down for summer simmering on the back of the business stove. . but retail trade is in front an sizzling! Instead of usual hof-weather lull, this summer is proving by far the best that retailers have known for more than a decade. Increased purchasing power traceable to defense "boom" is the dominant factor, of course, but lately 'scare buying" has been inceased as consumers tend to purchase beyond their current needs because of threats of shortages and price rises. This is especially true in the case of durable goods and staple clothing. One men's clothing chain is showing a gain of 51.4 per cent over last year, and big mail order companies which do a substantial business in durable consumer's items, have had gains from 30 to 42 per cent. A somewhat exaggerated example of how shortage and price-rise apprehension affects consumers is visible right now in the frantic rush at the silk stocking counters.
