OF SAFETY Children

First of all remember what your teacher has told you in school. Always watch and obey your safety patrol boy. He is experienced, and is able to guide you in safety!

Always watch the red and the green lights.

Don't start walking until the light has changed to green. Never cross the street if the light is red. Don't take chances!

When you cross a street corner, even if there are red and green lights there, be sure to look both ways before you walk. Also look down both cross streets for oncoming motorists.

If you are playing. . .stay out of the streets. Never run into the street as, the streets are for cars and not for people to play in. Play in the playgrounds and be safe!

You can be arrested by the policeman if you walk across the street in the middle of the block. This is "jay-walking," and if you want to be safe you will cross at corners.

OF SAFETY Motorist

The motorist's first duty to his city is to have his car in excellent repair. Don't drive your car if the brakes, horn or lights are defective. Better have them checked. Brakes will not stop car instantly on slick streets if tires are worn. Be safe, keep good tires all around at all times!

Never drive if you are tired. You must always be on the alert. Even then your speed

must conform with city limits and your common sense should govern the use of that limit! Safety patrol boys, who wear the white belt and breast bands, are your protection against accidents. Always obey these boy's signals,

the same as you do the automatic signal lights.

Govern your speed and alertness to driving conditions. Never speed when you see children playing. Slow down! Check your speed when children are going to and from school.

Several states now interpret law to hold any driver hitting a child under sixteen years of age for manslaughter. Remember that it is your responsibility. Protect precious lives!

And the boys hunger for some semblance of normal social lifehe kind they've always had at home. They are strangers in the community, and as their numbers increase, it becomes harder for them to solve this problem.

Even simpler need are not met n many of the towns. Toilet facilties are often lacking or inadequate: one small town has but one public comfort station, which is locked up on Saturday night. Norfolk, Va. is fortunate in having a large Navy Y. M. C. A.; a checker there counted 9,630 men going in and out a few Sundays ago.

This is a bad situation-bad for he men in uniform, bad for the communities directly affected, bad for National Defense, and bad for the whole nation. There is only one good thing about it: it can be helped, and everybody in the country can join in supplying the

This problem is not new; it was met in the last war by virtually the same agencies which have now joined their efforts in the United Service Organizations for National Defense-U. S. O., These agencies are: the Young Men's Christian Associations, the National Catholic Community Service, the Jewish Welfare Board, and the National Travelers Aid Assoc-

They have the full confidence of the Army and Navy Departments; and because we all know them from long experience in every American community they have the full confidence of both the public and the men in uniform. They did the job before; They boys want a place where they made any mistakes last time, it is their frank purpose not to make the same mistakes again.

There is no mystery about what needed to meet the situation. The boys want a place where htey go, away from military discipline; where they can take their mothers, or other visitors from home; where they can meet the local people under pleasant conditions; where they can buy a bite they can play games, read, write letters, talk to their buddies, or just sit down and relax. If they can find out about the entertainment the community affords, or about a place to obtain decent sleeping conditions at a fair price, so much the better. At the United Service Clubs which the U.S.O. will operate, they will be able to do all these things.

And there is still another way n which U. S. O. will help solve the human problems raised by our National Defense Program. The rapind growth of our new defense industries has attracted a legion of industrial workers --women as well as men. Some of this development has been away from the larger industrial centers: thus many of these workers are now living far from their normal home surroundings. In special emer- bid for national unity.
